NAVAL BATTLE AT PANAMA. Despatches of the 21st announced that naval battle between the Columbian Sovernment fleet and the revolutionaryfleet began Monday morning and was still in progress, in Panama harbour. The re colutionary fleet consisting of the steamers Padilla Darien and Gaitan were attempting to force a landing at Sabana, against the firing of Government guns.
