THE MANITOBA ELEVATOR QUESTION

The committee of the Manitoba Grain Growers have submitted plans for a system of government-owned elevators to the Government.

This plan seems to contemplate the Government providing all the elevator accommodation required in the Province. It is recommended that the existing elevators be bought, or if this cannot be done at a fair figure that new ones be built.
