What About Cold Storage?

What has become of that great Cold Storage project which was boomed so industriously by the Government last winter and spring? It is passing strange how silent the Government has been during the past summer and the present fall about the success of the measure which was the pet child of the Premier.

It will be remembered that the Premier addressed a letter to J. W. Trefethen & Co. in September of last year, enquiring for the terms on which they would be prepared to come to Newfoundland. "I believe there is a very good future for the development of the fisheries in this country by modern methods," he said and expressed a wish to receive from them a favourable proposition.

The negotiations continued and eventually an agreement was drawn up. It will be remembered that the contractors expressed some eagerness to get the agreement ratified by the Legislature as early as possible as they expressed a wish to start work as early as possible after the agreement had been finalized, and they were most anxious to know when the Legislature would meet. The Legislature did meet. Some radical changes in the Cold Storage Act of 1909 were proposed. The changes were strenuously opposed by the Opposition in the press and the Legislature and the Government were forced by public opinion to modify the agreement. Eventually a modified agreement was ratified and passed amidst paeons of praise from Executive members and government supporters.

What has come of it all? Where is the floating factory? Where are the other four factories? We have arrived at the end of October and nothing has materialized. Where is the Cold Storage plant with a capacity of not less than one million pounds that was to be erected, completed and put into operation before the close of this year?

Perhaps the Premier will furnish some information. He might also tell us whether the plans and specifications of the plant and its equipment called for this year have been submitted to the Governor in Council for approval and whether any approval has been given.

Then, again, it would be interesting to know something about the smoke house and the fish packing factory which, in addition to the Cold Storage Plant, the contract demanded should be completed and put in operation before the end of the year.

It is strange we hear so little about

these matters, to which so much publicity was given last winter and spring.

Rae Island Farm.

We call the attention of our readers to an advertisement from Mr. F. C. Berneau, Acting Cashier of the Government Savings Bank, cancelling the call for tenders for the purchase of Rae Island Farm. The representation of our correspondent has clearly been effective, as it is announced that no such tenders will be required or received. Public opinion could not be ignored and our correspondents have undoubtedly scored.

Accidentally Shot Himself Saturday.

Both Mr. Hutchings, K.C., Deputy Minister of Justice, and Inspector General Sullivan had news from Botwood Saturday to the effect that a lad named Waterman, aged 12 years, of that place, was the victim of a very dangerous accident. He was sitting on the beach with a 22 calibre rifle in his hands, waiting for a chance to shoot a "beachy" bird, when the piece was accidentally discharged by him, the bullet lodging in his leg. Dr. Bowden was summoned and hurried to the lad's aid, and after much trouble located the bullet about nine inches from where it entered. The doctor made an incision and extracted the bullet. The patient is doing as well as can be expected.

The Hygienic Aspects of Gas Lighting and Cooking.

Experiments were made at the Lewisham Infirmary during the month of November 1910, with the following in view:-

- (1) To compare hygienically the relative values of the open fire and the Gas Radiator as warming agents.
- (2) To ascertain if, and to what extent, the quality of the atmosphere of a room is affected by incandescent gas burners and lamps.
- (3) To ascertain the hygienic value of the gas fire.

The experiments were carried out by Dr. F. S. Toogood, M.D., London, D.P.H., the Medical Superintendent of the Infirmary, and the full report of the experiments appeared in the London Medical Magazine, February 1911. The general conclusions arrived were as follows:-

- (1) That both large and small apartments which have normal means of ventilation gas consumed in modern incandescent burners can be used for lighting without any detriment to health, being found, in fact, to assist ventilation by the increased circulation of the air.
- (2) That a gas fire, properly constructed and fixed, not only does not vitiate the air, but is a valuable adjunct to the ventilation of the room. Its advantages in the sickroom in respect of its reliability, avoidance of noise, freedom from dust producing propensities, and saving of both work and anxiety, are obvious to every professional man or woman.
- (3) That in large rooms, adequately ventilated, fuelless gas stoves can be used for heating without any hygienic disadvantages, the heated products of combustion (mainly CO₂ and water vapour) ascending quickly above breathing level. This method of heating by radiation and convection from fuelless gas stoves, is economical, but proper ventilation of the buildings in which it is adopted is essential, which, of course, is also the case whatever means of heating is adopted. A ward or other public building in which gas radiators cannot be used with advantage is improperly ventilated.

SECURED GOOD HEADS.—Mr. Alexander, who was shooting at Glenwood and secured several fine sets of antlers, returned by the express to-day.

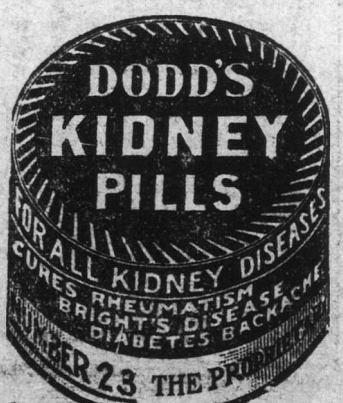

Police Court News.
