The Navy Clearing a Channel to Kiel.

Constitutional Changes in Germany --- Austria Breaking Up--Bolsheviki in Russia Oppose Allies Entry.

WILL DISARM SHIPS.

LONDON, Nov. 25. A flotilla of mine sweepers left the Firth of Forth this morning to clear a passage to Kiel for the British squadron which, it is understood, will disarm and intern the remnants of the German navy.

KEEPING ARMISTICE.

ROME, Nov. 24. Italian troops occupied Innsbruck, the capital of the Austrian Tyrol, on Friday, in accordance with the terms of the Austrian armistice.

ALLIED TROOPS MEET OPPOSITION.

ARCHANGEL, Nov. 24. (By the A.P.)—The Entente and American troops have encountered strong opposition both on the Volga and on the railway.

NEW CONSTITUTION.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 25. An agreement has been reached between the German Soldiers' and Workmen's Council and the Government.

LONDON, Nov. 25. This morning's newspapers display prominently the German advice regarding the agreement between the Soldiers' and Workmen's Council and the Government.

CUTTING DOWN WAR EXPENDITURE.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25. Naval estimates for 1920 have been reduced \$1,150,215,000 as the result of the signing of the armistice.

LIMITING REVENUE BILL.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25. By a strict party vote the Senate Financial Committee to-night decided to recommend that the yield from the 1920 Revenue Bill be limited to \$4,000,000,000.

THE GERMAN SITUATION.

LONDON, Nov. 25. (British Wireless Service.)—The latest reports received in England from Germany indicate that the internal situation there has reached a critical stage.

STAGE.

Although a proclamation has been issued declaring that all political power is in the hands of the German Socialist Republic and the Soldiers' and Workmen's Council, opposition to such a Government is growing outside Berlin.

OUTBREAKS EXPECTED IN PERU.

LIMA, Peru, Nov. 25. Peruvian newspapers call upon the Government to request a cessation of anti-Peruvian demonstrations in Chile.

BOLSHEVIK PRISONERS DIE.

VLADIVOSTOK, Nov. 25. Half dead from starvation and disease, many beyond help, 1,321 survivors of the original total of 2,100 Bolshevik prisoners and refugees in a train sent across Siberia by the Czech-Slovak troops fighting in Samara, European Russia, have arrived at Nikolai, near Vladivostok.

IN A HURRY.

BASEL, Nov. 25. (Havas)—The Hungarian Government has requested the Allies to hold an immediate discussion of peace terms, according to reports reaching Swiss newspapers.

ALLIES IN BLACK SEA.

PARIS, Nov. 25. The Bosphorus has been cleared of mines, Allied warships have entered the Black Sea and visited various ports from Varna, around the southern coast of Novorossysk.

MINERS DEMANDS.

BERLIN, Nov. 24. Via Copenhagen (by the A.P.)—The Silesian coal miners are demanding a six hour work day and thirty marks as the daily wage and are threatening strikes which, under the existing transportation difficulties would menace Berlin's coal supply.

FRENCH M. P. RELATES EXPERIENCE.

PARIS, Nov. 25. Deputy Ingels, Socialist, was welcomed to the Chamber of Deputies today after being a prisoner of war for two years in Germany.

BIG LINER SAILS.

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 25. The Cunard line steamship Mauritania sailed from Liverpool this morning bound for New York.

PROBABLY PARIS.

PARIS, Nov. 25. (By the A. P.)—The conferences on the preliminaries of peace probably will be held in Paris instead of Versailles, owing to the superior accommodations and conveniences in the capital.

BRINGING HOME U. S. SHIPS.

PARIS, Nov. 24. The American naval establishment in European ports and waters is being reduced rapidly since the armistice. It is intended to order home soon all small craft, destroyers and submarines used principally as convoys, except for a limited number for patrol and escort duty.

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
