HONORABLE JOHN HARVEY.

With regret we chronicle the death of one of Newfoundland's foremost sons-Honorable John Harvey, business man and legislator. A message from New York, received in the city, stated that he had passed away at 1 p.m. yesterday, the victim of a relapse in meningitis. Operated on on Christmas Day, his recovery seemed assured and it was not until New Year's Day that the relapse came. In the mercantile, social and

His large business interests prevented acquiescence, but the deep interest which he always evinced in public matters left the hope that the day might come when he would be in a position to devote his time, onergies and great abilities in this direction. He received his education at Haileybury College, England. He became a partner in the business of his father in 1887. He held office as President of the Board of Trade, and was one of



Imports for 1919. (Trade Review.)

St. John's imported roundly last year 290,000 barrels of flour as against 181,577 in 1918; 29,000 barrels pork as compared with 36,828 in 1918; 73,000 barrels beef, as against 27,592 last year; 11,968 punche molasses as compared with 10,490 last year; 119,000 hundredweights of hay as against 111,035 in 1918. Also, 40,000 tons salt as compared 70,059 last year. Our coal imports amount to 88,000 this year as compared with 94,000 last year.
