A very human story was told in two brief chapters recently in the Willesden Police Court.

A man applying for advice informed the magistrate that seven years ago he advertised that he would like to adopt a little boy. A lady replied that he could have her child if he sent the railway fare, the boy to be sent to Paddington in charge of a railway guard.

The money was sent, and a boy of seven duly arrived with a written document of surrender. He was now a boy of 14.

Recently the boy's mother had arrived from the country, and had made two attempts to kidnap him.

Applicant left the court after being told the magistrate could do nothing, as the child belonged to the mother. Within a few minutes a well-dressed woman entered—the mother of the boy—and told her own story. Seven years ago, she said, she was very ill and believed herself dying.
