## St. John's Will Suffer

BY REMOVAL OF PORTIA.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I have read with interest your editorials, and also letters from Travellers. One and Two, on how the South West Coast is being served in the way of Coastal Boats, and the service we are getting. The taking away of the "Portia" is the most absurd thing the Government has done in all their career as "Business Managers." On this Coast it now takes from ten to twelve days, to get freight or a reply from letters to St. John's by the "Glencoe," as mails that go to Argentina by her, cannot be answered or freight shipped on return trip. They have to wait until the ship goes to Port aux Basques and back again. The people of this Coast have not kicked, as they regarded the taking away of the "Portia" as a matter of economy on the part of the Government, but when we read by the Public Dispatch, that she is being used as a freight boat, to take salt North, and to bring back salmon for Cold Storage purposes, then we think it is time to call on the Government to put her back on the Coast she was intended for, when the first contract was made. We have taken this outrage lying down "so to speak," but we do not intend to do so any longer. Already there is a rising tide of indignation against the action of the Government, and also against the Representatives of the three Districts from Placentia to Port aux Basques, who agreed to the cessation of this Service. But there is a remedy for this in our own hands, and it will be the St. John's business men that will be the sufferers in the way of trade. Already negotiations are being entered into with a firm at Halifax, to run a boat from that port as far east as Marytown, and if sufficient freight offers, they will continue the service until December. This Coast is not down and out by a long way, as I hear that the fishery from Marytown to Harbor Breton is the best on record for many years. Passing through Burin last week, the writer saw trap skiffs loaded to the gunwales with fish, and heard excellent reports of all the fishermen along that section. If the Government are wise, they will put the "Portia" back at once on her usual route and keep her there, so that the South West Coast can be served—as it is entitled to be served—by a boat like the "Portia." Surely our Northern friends have enough boats and trains to keep them well supplied, while the business men of this Coast have to be content with a service every ten or fifteen days as weather permits. Now you business men of Burin, Grand Bank, Belleoram and Burgeo, make it known to the Government, that you will not put up with the service you are getting, any longer. They put the Fish Regulations over you, do not let them put this across you also. Thanking you for space, Mr. Editor.

## Mission Ship in Port.

S.S. HARMONY FROM LONDON.

S.S. Harmony, Capt. Jackson, arrived in port Saturday evening, 10 days from London, having left there June 21st. Adverse weather was met in the English Channel and for several days the ship anchored in St. Helen's Bay, Isle of Wight, afterwards proceeding to Dartmouth where bunker coal was taken. The ship left the latter port July 3rd and on the passage across had to contend with heavy westerly gales. The Harmony brought one passenger Miss Rowe, who is bound to Makovik as a teacher at the Moravian School at that place. Miss Rowe will be remaining at the station for at least three years. The ship will load building material for the mission stations at Nain, destroyed by fire last year.

## Prospero From Northward.

POOR FISHERY NEWS.

S.S. Prospero, Capt. Field, arrived in port yesterday morning after a splendid run from the Northward. The ship was to Quirpon and made all ports of call both going and coming. Capt. Field reports a poor fishery in many places, being practically a blank in White Bay and Twillingate. In Bonavista Bay traps are doing exceptionally well but were hampered by a shortage of bait. The ship brought a large quantity of freight and sails again on Wednesday next.

## Judges and Their Wills.

The late Earl of Halsbury, once Lord Chancellor, made his will so badly that affidavits from the witnesses were required as to its condition and execution before probate was allowed.

Our great lawyers seem to be very careless in drawing up their own wills, and the greater their fame the worse they seem to become in this respect.

Lord St. Helier, President for many years of the Probate Division of the High Court, when he was known as Sir Francis Jeune, left as his will a document that was contrary to all the rules and regulations of a valid will. Yet Lord St. Helier presided over the proving of thousands of wills, accurate and otherwise, during his legal career.

It was never quite settled as to what were Lord Grimthorpe's wishes when he died, for he left a series of most involved documents.

Lords Brougham and Lyndhurst, great Chancellors of their day, left wills that were far from satisfactory. And the will of Lord St. Leonards could never be found—it is doubtful if he ever made one.


