Our Dumb Animals

REPORT OF CHIEF AGENT FOR WEEK ENDING, NOV. 30TH.

Attended two sales of cattle at the St. John's Abattoir Company's premises, also the ridding of 18 head of cattle at the Railway Station; also a shipment of 60 head of cattle from the S.S. Sachem and 18 horses. Some trouble was experienced in landing these cattle principally owing to the crowd of people who get around in the gateway. The cattle were very much frightened when landed. One beast went overboard and was in the water some time. I had to phone the police department to get some men to keep the crowd back. Everything possible, as far as feeding etc., was done for the cattle while on board the Sachem for their comfort. I humanely put to death a large horse belonging to the Horwood Lumber Company.

This horse was injured in the hip, and sooner than he could suffer Mr. C. Horwood had it destroyed. This firm deserves great credit for the way they have their horses attended to and Mr. S. Simmonds, their stable boss, certainly does his duty. I also humanely put to death a dog for Mr. Harold Macpherson, and another for Mr. O'Keefe, Hamilton Street; and the latter contributed toward the funds of the Society. Mr. Macpherson's already mentioned Scotch dog, which he has contained to have eight barrels of flour to a load at this season. To my mind ten barrels from the Furness Withy Co., A. Harroy, Shear's Wharf, and the Red Cross Wharf is too much at this time of the year as the average load is from 1,500 to 1,800 lbs., and is sufficient for a horse to haul. I hope all the firms will agree to this. Owing to the wet weather, we have some horses chafed very much, but the owners are doing all possible for them. I sent in two lame horses for a rest. Also another with a sore shoulder and one with a sore back, for treatment. I received word from a friend of the Society of the condition of a horse at Kelligrews. I am going to investigate this case. I would also like people to do their shopping earlier and give expression a chance to get home and dry their horses after the day, as ten hours' work in an express is enough without being out late at night. All friends of those who cannot speak for themselves always order their goods early. I visited the Nfld. Poultry Show twice daily in order to watch the feeding and watering of the birds. The work has been done splendidly and I had no complaints to make—all the birds are being well taken care of. I must express the appreciation and thanks of the Society to General Manager Russell of the Newfoundland Railway for having new water shuttles installed at Bishop's Falls.
