London All Agog Over Curzon Will

Standard Declares Lloyd George The Premier Referred to.

LONDON, July 25-(C.P.)-London last night was all agog over a statement printed in the Evening Standard Friday that it understood it was former Prime Minister David Lloyd George of whom Marquis Curzon of Keddleston dealt with "pungent illuminaing comment" in the so-called 'literary testament" of his will, which

was probated Thursday. The newspaper said Marquis Curzon's sharp shafts were directed at Mr. Lloyd George for having adopted the functions of British Foreign Secretary during the arrangement of the peace treaty at Versailles. Curzon, during the framing of the treaty, was Lloyd George's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

Nothing has been made public con cerning the contents of the document, which was suppressed in the probate court because of the "startling elations" it contained concerned the unnamed Premier and other unnamd former colleagues of Curzon in political life. 
