Y. M. C. A.—The regular meeting of the Young Men's Christian Association was held in their rooms last evening. Vice-President M. A. Watson in the chair. Mr. Geo. Patterson gave a very good essay, "The Rise and Progress of the Young Men's Christian Association." Mr. Howatt and Mr. Rothwell, from the Berlin Association, gave short practical addresses. The expression which she is said to have made use of, that "there was too much Irish about her to be killed by a nigger," has turned out to be correct.

ROMBERY.—Thos Stoddard and three other men were arrested last night by Chief Constable Kelly, charged with robbing Charles Willoughby and John Hudson. These two were leaving the show ground about dusk and when walking up Buckland's hill, these fellows came up behind, pushed Willoughby over, struck Hudson on the head, and robbed him of his watch and \$10. It is not known yet what they took from Willoughby. On information being laid, Mr. Kelly arrested the parties, but Hudson could only identify Stoddard, and the others were let off. Stoddard was brought up this morning, and remanded till Monday.

The Missouri Murder.

London, Oct. 3.
The Grand Jury for the county of Middlesex yesterday brought in a true bill against Thomas Coyle for the murder of George Campbell. The trial will commence before His Lordship Chief Justice Fry at London, on Monday next. Mr Mackenzie, Q.C. has received instructions to conduct the prosecution for the crown in this case.

Knoxville Tenn., Oct. 3.—Three passenger coaches on the mail train going west, on East Tenn. Virginia and Georgia R.R. fell through a trestle of a bridge, three miles west of Greenville this morning. One brakeman was killed, seven passengers seriously wounded and twenty slightly injured.

Paris Oct. 3.—It is rumored that President Thiers, intends at the next session of the Assembly to urge conservative deputies to support the proposition for definitive establishment by Proclamation of permanent republic, based on strictly conservative principles.

London Oct. 3.—Despatches from India say it is rumored that a Russian force is marching on Khiva.

The Staffordshire iron masters have reduced the prices of finished iron two pounds per ton.

Springfield Mass. Oct. 3.—An explosion in Hoosac tunnel yesterday, killed Yahl, Cunningham and Stephen McCarthy and several others badly hurt.

London Oct. 3.—The rinderpest has appeared in Fangbass parish, west Riding of Yorkshire.

Madrid, Oct. 3.—Nothing additional to the despatch forwarded last night, has been received in relation to the fire in the Monastery and the Palace of Escorial. It is feared that all the treasures in the building have been destroyed or irreparably damaged.
