In the Northwest it is showery over the greater part of the territory and some excessive rains have fallen in Manitoba. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 47-64; Quebec, 47-64; Montreal, 50-67; Kingston, 57-67; Port Arthur, 52-66; Toronto, 56-67; Winnipeg, 57-67; Halifax, 59-67.
Local temperatures: Highest 84; lowest 76.
