LIBERAL LONDON.

The result of yesterday's Dominion election in the city of London must be decidedly satisfactory to the Liberal party in the country, but especially so to the believers in a fair play policy of taxation in the Forest City itself.

For over 30 years the city of London has been dominated by the influence of Mr. Carling, and it is unnecessary to say not always to the advantage of the taxpayers. In recent years, however, London has become more and more Liberal, and less and less inclined to tolerate personal rule.

In 1887 Mr. Carling received notice to quit, but he failed to take it, and yesterday the people, with a plainness that cannot be mistaken, told him that "his hour had come."

The contest has been fought on the part of the Liberals with a straightforwardness which even their opponents had to admire. The Liberal candidate and his supporters kept to the point that trade freedom was a good thing; that the taxes were too high; that the people needed a change, and that now was the time to effect it. Their opponents used their best endeavors to have the fight conducted on issues of an irrelevant kind; but the friends of trade freedom took the advice of the ADVERTISER and conducted the campaign on the straight issue, and without needless bitterness. The result shows that it will pay them always to show straight to the line in future, let the chips fall where they may.

Having scored so signal a victory, the friends of Mr. Hyman can afford to be magnanimous. We trust that they will forgive and forget the unkind things that some of the more inconsiderate of the Conservative orators have said about them, and that we shall all go forward now hand-in-hand, and municipally, commercially and socially work cordially together, Liberal and Conservative, low tax and high tax advocates, striving to advance the general welfare.

THE NEW MEMBER FOR LONDON.

Mr. Charles Smith Hyman, the new member for the city of London, who yesterday defeated the Minister of Agriculture by the handsome majority of 183, is a man in the prime of life. He is not 40 years of age, yet he has for over 20 years been a prominent figure in the social and business circles of the Forest City. The son of a pioneer of the West, at an early age he was called on to follow in the footsteps of his honored sire in conducting one of the largest manufacturing concerns in Ontario. He has succeeded in maintaining the prestige attained by his father, and at the same time has found opportunity to serve his native city in various public capacities. As a member of the City Council, he was speedily elevated to the prominent position of Corporation Finance Minister, and while occupying that post earned the praise of the taxpayers by unraveling and remedying various financial abuses that had cost the taxpayers many a hard-earned dollar. The citizens recognized the signal service which Mr. Hyman then performed by electing him to the Mayor's chair by a handsome majority. At last Dominion election Mr. Hyman was selected as the Liberal candidate for the city, and, through reasons that need not be here stated, but which reflected no credit on some of his opponents, he was defeated by the small majority of 39.

When, a month ago, the Dominion Government sprung the elections on the country, all hearts in the Liberal party were turned to Mr. Hyman, and at considerable sacrifice to his business he responded to the unanimous call from his fellow-citizens to be the standard bearer of the party of trade progress and reduced taxation. Our readers know how valiantly he has fought the battle, and with what unanimity his followers have, shoulder to shoulder, marched beside him to victory.

Socially, as well as commercially, Mr. Hyman will be a distinct gain to the Liberal party in the new House of Commons. He is the best all-round lawn tennis player in Canada, and a first-class athlete. In fact, he is an admirer and supporter of all manly sports.

THE LIBERAL COMMITTEES.
 Mr. Hyman must be proud of his committees. No man could wish for more earnest and devoted workers than the gentlemen who championed his cause in the several wards of the city. The committees embraced citizens, young and old, from every rank and condition of life. They worked like Trojans, as only men can do who believe in the man and principles that they have espoused. We are proud of Mr. Hyman's committees, and all the more so because they have taken their victory with a moderation that becomes gentlemen.

KEEP UP THE ORGANIZATION.

The Liberals have carried the day in London, after as fair and manly a battle as has ever been fought by any political party. They had a long wait, but they felt that they had right on their side, and they worked for the triumph that has now come. The defeat of an ordinary member of Parliament would have been something to be proud of, but to wrest an important constituency like London from the domination of a Minister of the Crown, supported by all the influences which a long lease of power and a species of Family Compactism could assure, is indeed a victory of enormous importance.

Success has been achieved chiefly through two agencies:

1. The having a good cause, honestly and persistently advocated.
2. Thorough organization and cordial co-operation.

Our friends should bear this in mind. As eternal vigilance is the price of liberty, so perpetual preparedness is ever the best means to achieve victory for correct principles of government in every sphere of the body politic.

MINISTERS DEFEATED.

Mr. Carling, the Minister of Agriculture, will not feel lonely in his defeat.

At least three of his former colleagues and two prospective candidates for seats in the Tory Government, have been numbered with the slain, while Sir Adolphe Caron, the Minister of Militia, failed to secure election in Chicomitum, one of the constituencies in which he took refuge when compelled to flee from Quebec county, which has been carried by the Liberals.

Mr. Foster, Minister of Finance, has been defeated by Col. Donville, an able resident of King's county, N. B. The defeat of Mr. Foster, while a big blow to the Government, will not be regretted by the majority of Canadians. He is a thoroughly-going charlatan, who showed himself prepared to smother every former profession for the sake of securing favor and preferment in the eyes of the Tories.

His successor in the representation of King's is the nephew of Mr. Donville, the well-known manager of the Grand Trunk shops at Hamilton.

Mr. Colby, Minister without portfolio, represented a border constituency. It was he who, in reply to Hon. David Mills in the last session of last Parliament, expressed the belief that the Canadian farmers did not need reciprocity with the United States. By replacing Mr. Colby with Mr. Rider, a member of a fine old Eastern Townships' family, the Government have given Mr. Colby and the Government of which he was a member a significant rebuke.

Equally strong has been the condemnation of Dr. Ferguson, of Welland, and Mr. Patterson, of North Essex, both of whom, though kept posing by their friends as prospective members of the Cabinet, have been left at home.

The Government may not, as the phrase goes, have been great shakes, but it got a great shake.

SOUTH MIDDLESEX.

Mr. Chisholm was never in it in South Middlesex, and Mr. Armstrong, the old representative, has again been returned by a largely increased majority.

HON. ALEX. MACKENZIE.

The Grand Old Man of the Canadian Liberal party was gerrymandered in East York, but he refused to take an easier constituency, trusting to the good sense of the people to vindicate his decision. At last election, the unsavory Boulton was put up against him. In this contest, Wm. McLean, of the Toronto World, did his best to defeat him. But East York was stood by the veteran Liberal, despite all the attacks on him, and the country will honor the electors for it.

THE FRONTIER COUNTIES.

The frontier counties of Western Ontario did nobly for trade freedom yesterday. Sir John Macdonald knew what he was about when he rushed the elections on before the full effect of the high tax policy was felt, when the marketing of next summer begins. A year's experience would have sickened even intensely-Conservative constituencies of the trade restrictionist policy of the Macdonald Government.

NORTH ESSEX REDEEMED.

Well done, McGregor! The grand old riding of North Essex has done itself credit in selecting Mr. McGregor as its representative. Though Mr. J. C. Patterson, its late Conservative member, was Chairman of the Ontario Conservative Association, and had the promise of the Postmaster-Generalship if the Conservatives carried the country, he has been cut down by the overwhelming vote of the populace, who, living near the border, best know the benefits of freedom of trade between the two countries. Mr. McGregor, M.P.-elect, has had ample experience in municipal and parliamentary life, and will be a distinct accession to the ranks of the Liberal party at Ottawa.

BOTHWELL.

The gerrymander was intended to kill the political prospects of Hon. David Mills in Bothwell, but the more persistently the Liberals stick to the honorable gentleman the bigger becomes his majority. He has been re-elected by a largely-increased vote. The victory of Mr. Mills is in every sense of the word a great one.

WEST LAMBTON.

West Lambton stands by Mr. J. F. Lister, its old representative. It gives him a splendid majority. Mr. Lister has already proved one of the most useful members on the Liberal side of the House. He is a fighter for the principles of good government and is certain to make his mark in the new Parliament.

WEST HURON.

That veteran Liberal, Mr. M. C. Cameron, has redeemed West Huron by a handsome majority. The Conservative wire-pullers so cordially detested Mr. Cameron's critical ability and so feared his denunciation of wickedness in high places that they gerrymandered him out of his seat, and left the grand old county of Huron, supposedly, with the Grits hived. But Mr. Cameron and his stalwart admirers in the west riding went valiantly to work and have turned a Tory majority into a handsome majority for Liberalism.

No man will be more warmly greeted in the new House by the occupants of the Liberal benches. No man is more cordially feared by the worse element of the Conservative party. He is indeed a "tear to evildoers."

EAST ELGIN.

It is to be regretted that the majority of the electors of East Elgin have not seen fit to re-elect their old member, Dr. Wilson. There were few more useful members in the old House, and no one could have more carefully looked after the interests of his constituents. The doctor was a general favorite in room No. 6, and there will be many regrets that he has not secured his election.

LINCOLN ALSO REDEEMED.

A most satisfactory result of the campaign has been the defeat of Sylvester Neelon, the candidate who was championed by the notorious Rykert in Lincoln. A worthy man will represent Lincoln county in the new Parliament, which for the first time in many years has done itself justice in the selection of a representative. William Gibson, M. P.-elect, is a decent man, a large employer of labor, and an energetic and able citizen. Lincoln's selection will be generally indorsed.

EVEN M'GEEVY GOES.

Sir Hector Langevin has been re-elected, while his compatriot in the great scandal has been defeated by Mr. Hearn in Quebec West, contrary to expectations. This defeat will not suppress the investigation of the ugly scandal, which will be one of the most sensational events in the new Parliament.

Mr. Tarte, the Quebec editor, who has undertaken to indict the Minister for his share in the scandal, has been returned to Parliament, and will be in a position to make his promises good. Extraordinary developments are promised.

KINGSTON.

Sir John Macdonald's illness helped him in Kingston. He undoubtedly got many votes through sympathy. No Liberal will grudge him his seat, though regretting that so able and progressive a citizen as Mr. Gunn is kept out of public life. No other man than the Tory leader could have defeated Mr. Gunn.

KENT.

Electors of Kent county, you have done well. You could not get a more able and painstaking representative than Archibald Campbell. You discriminated excellently when you left the man with the funny name at home.

NORTH PERTH SOLID.

Mr. Henson has been replaced in North Perth by Mr. Grievies, a representative farmer. The change is a good one, and the Liberals are to be congratulated on achieving it.
