EFFECTS OF THE DOWNPOUR.

The Engineer Wants \$4,000 Which to Repair Damages.

Mr. L. E. Meyer's Offer for the Street Railway Franchise First Filed and Then Voted to Lie Over.

It was a few minutes over time before the members of No. 1 committee started business, but when they did they handled quite a number of items. A communication was read in reference to a claim of Westminster township for remission of school rates, which was filed.

C. A. Kingston sent in a specification for the remodeling of the streets for the use of the street railway. Filed.

The committee were asked to investigate the expenses of the Old Men's Home. The matter will be attended to.

Mr. Sussex's application for remission of police court fine was allowed, if he will comply with the engineer's requests.

L. E. Meyer's final offer for the street railway was laid out, and then it was decided to merely lay it over.

J. Ryan and J. Brooks' fines on application were remitted. Mrs. Jane Bayley's taxes were remitted.

Engineer Graydon asked for \$4,000 for repairs to culverts, bridges, roads, etc., which were damaged by the recent flood. It was decided that the committee keep within the estimates.

The Free Library Board requested that debentures for \$20,000 be issued. In regard to this matter the chairman presented a petition, two yards long, from John Campbell and others, requesting that the matter of issuing debentures for the free library be voted on by the people. The committee have no power.

Graydon & Graydon, representing the Ontario Mutual Assurance Company, stated that this company had \$3,000 worth of debentures of the city of London on their hands in May, 1892, when the company went into liquidation. The Ontario Government took charge of these debentures, which were handed to the city treasurer in October, 1892. The directors of the company asked for the interest on this sum during the intervening months. Mr. Graydon, who appeared for them, stated that they had no legal claim, but if the city or any person in connection with the city were put to any trouble over granting it, the sum would be remitted. The matter will be brought up before the council.

Mrs. Long, of Bridges street, asked for remission of a \$6 fine and also her taxes of 1893, as her income at present is extremely small.

Messrs. Wood and O'Hara, brokers, were requested to withdraw, and the tenders for debentures consisting of \$25,000 for two years and \$50,000 for seven years, bearing 4 per cent interest were opened. Mr. George A. Simcoe's (Toronto) tender of \$90.07 for the former and \$93.51 for the latter was accepted.

The monthly accounts, amounting to \$12,333.46, were passed, as was also the police court clerk's report.

The members present were Chairman Judd, Secretary Pope and Alds. J. W. Jones, T. Pritchard, J. A. Fitzgerald and Robt. Carrothers.

BRANT.

BRUCE.

The Port Elgin Times says depositors will lose heavily by the collapse of Allen's Bank there, and there is much indignation against the management. It says: "A. Miller, the manager, has not been seen since Thursday of last week, and it is suspected that Port Elgin has seen the last of him. He was village treasurer, and it is said owes the corporation about \$600."

Alex. Ramage, one of the oldest and most influential of the business men of Chesley, died the other day. Mr. Ramage settled in Chesley over twenty years ago. He owned the largest grist mill in the county.

ELGIN.

At St. Thomas Thursday the police magistrate sentenced Harry Knight, who stole a gold watch, to an indefinite period, not exceeding five years, in the Provincial Reformatory at Penetanguishene.

Eddie Potter, the little 9 year-old son of a widowed mother at Tilsonburg, was drowned Thursday night while swimming in Cowan's brickyard in that town. His little sister was nearly drowned in attempting to rescue him.

Miss A. E. Marty has been appointed teacher of modern languages at the St. Thomas Collegiate Institute, to succeed Mr. W. Packenham, resigned. Miss Marty is an M.A. of Queen's University, of which she is an honor graduate in English and modern languages. She was the first to win a medal in the latter department for taking highest honor standing, and has taught French and German in the university during the illness of the professor. There were 25 applications for the position.

ESSEX.

While Mr. J. D. A. Dziel was boring for water on his farm near St. Joachim on Saturday, the drill pierced a gas pocket. The drill and rods were lifted out of the hole in an instant and thrown some distance by the force of the gas. Stones, sand and slush were thrown out of the hole with great force and continued until Monday noon. The gas still comes as strong as when first struck, but the hole seems to be freely water and mud. The roar of the gas is like distant thunder. (Comber Herald.)

A 2-year-old son of Eugene Lambert, Wellington avenue, Windsor, died on Wednesday night under circumstances which indicate poisoning. Dr. Sampson had been attending a 4-year-old son of Mr. Lambert's for a similar complaint, and it was on Monday that the youngest child was taken ill with convulsions. The parents are unaware as to how the child was poisoned, but it is believed it was caused through eating flower bulbs.

HURON.

Whilst returning from Goderich an accident occurred to Mrs. Leech, wife of Rev. W. W. Leech, of Clinton. The horse becoming frightened at a load of wood on the side of the road shied, with the result that the buggy was turned completely upside down, throwing Mrs. Leech out on her head. She received rather an ugly cut on the side of her head, necessitating several stitches.

John Harrison, of Goderich township, has sold his farm of 87 acres on Bayfield concession, being the west half of lot 73 and north half of lot 73, to his son, James H. Harrison, for the sum of \$2,000.

KENT.

Wednesday night, while Nelson Hopkins, of Dresden, was rolling a log from a car in Huston's mill, the handle of the car hook broke, and Mr. Hopkins, whose weight was entirely on the handle, was thrown violently to the floor, breaking both bones of his leg a short distance above the ankle.

LAMBTON.

In connection with the recent out-playing case in Forest, it was stated that the arrest was made in the Franklin House. This was incorrect; it was another hotel. Proprietor George Webster does not allow cards or other games to be played in his hotel, which is a strictly first-class house, as the traveling public will testify.

MIDDLESEX.

A quiet wedding took place Thursday afternoon at the residence of Miss McBrayne, St. Thomas, when Miss Clara O'Neil, of Belmont, was married to William Fitzpatrick, proprietor of the Westminster case factory.

St. Paul's Church, Kerwood, was crowded to the doors Thursday to witness the marriage ceremony between Miss Harriet Louise, second daughter of Mr. John Hughes, of Kerwood, and Mr. Harry Armstrong, of the Bank of Commerce, Woodstock. The ceremony was performed by Revs. E. W. Hughes, of Kerwood, and J. M. Cunniff, of Woodstock. The bride and groom were accompanied by Mr. E. C. Spaulding, of the Bank of Commerce staff, Woodstock, acted as groomsmen.

The death is announced of Miss Margaret K. McKee, of South Elfrid. Miss McKee was in the 61st year of her age. The funeral was in the largest in the history of the township, 173 carriages following the remains to their last resting place. Services were conducted by Rev. A. Henderson, of Argyle.

St. Thomas Journal: A meeting of the Chippewas and Oneidas was held at Melburne the other day to consider a proposition from the C. P. R. to convey delegates to the Northwest free of expense. It appeared that certain individuals had conceived the idea of inducing the Indians to give up their reserves there in exchange for C. P. R. lands, and the Oneidas were more prudent, and the matter remains in statu quo.

OXFORD.

Donald McCorquodale, of Lakeside, had A. Beattie, from near Thamesford, before the judge at Woodstock the other day for 75 cents, a balance on a jackknife trade made at Lakeside about two years ago. Beattie had to pay the 75 cents and a nice bill of costs. Mr. McCorquodale got the 75 cents but had to pay some \$8 or \$10 costs.

James McDonald, youngest daughter of the late Capt. John McDonald, and wife of H. P. Brown, county treasurer, died very suddenly at an early hour Thursday morning in the 65th year of her age.

J. C. Tisdale has been appointed high county constable of Oxford.

Miss Ida Gainer, of Norwich, has been seriously ill from swallowing toothache gum. She had put the gum in an aching tooth, and while asleep it worked out and she swallowed it. At one time her life was almost despaired of, but she is now recovering.

A Tilsonburg correspondent writes: When going home late on Saturday night, Fred Smith, of Tilsonburg, was held up near White bridge by three highwaymen, who demanded what cash he had on his person. The robbers relieved Mr. Smith of his watch, knife and cash, which amounted to about \$8. The robbers kindly restored the watch and knife, and then made off before the police could get on their track.

PERTH.

During the storm on Tuesday morning the brick residence of Mr. John Brine, Shoebottom's Corners, Blanshard, was struck by lightning and so badly wrecked that the family had to move to another house until it is repaired. Mrs. Brine and her son James, as well as her sister, Miss Jeannie Smith, were severely stunned by the shock.

John Whyte, jun., of the firm of John Whyte & Son, St. Marys, is on his way to the old country, as the doctors are of the opinion the sea voyage will be very beneficial to his impaired health.

Robert Treacy, contractor, St. Marys, with several of his employees, met with a bad mishap in East Nisour the other evening while returning from work. Treacy alighted on a barb wire fence and the

driver fell upon him. He was terribly hurt about the face and his clothes torn to shreds. Simon Henry, the driver, had the nail of the initial finger of the right hand torn off and was also badly shaken up. Stephen Towle sustained a cut across the wrist, necessitating five stitches being put in. John McMillan was thrown over the dashboard, and alighting upon the ground head first was rendered unconscious for some time.

The Bishop of Huron has offered the rectorate of Mitchell, made vacant by the removal of Rev. A. D. Dawdney, to Rev. J. T. Harrin, of Bayfield, and he will likely accept. Rev. Mr. Owen, the first choice, did not accept as his congregation urged upon him to remain, and he acceded to their wishes.

WATERLOO.

The very sudden death of John Hayes, treasurer of the township of Wellesley, startled his friends the other day. He was extensively engaged in farming, as he owned and cultivated two very fine farms of 200 acres each.

The annual convention of the Waterloo W. C. T. U. was held in Knox Church, W. C. T. U. on Thursday, June 14, the retiring president, gave an interesting address on the work of the union. The following officers were elected: Mrs. Graham, honorary president; Mrs. E. B. Cavers, Galt, president; Mrs. Roast, Berlin, vice-president; Miss J. A. Neilson, Ayr, corresponding secretary; Miss Rensselaer, secretary; Mrs. Williams, treasurer. A mass meeting was held in the evening, when F. S. Spence, of Toronto, delivered a stirring address on temperance.

WELLINGTON.

Mr. W. B. Cockburn, of Guelph, arrived home from the old country on Friday last after a very pleasant and successful buying trip. He brought home with him 72 head of Oxford Down sheep, and has eight to follow after the Royal Agricultural Show. Selling Out.

The Dominion Government Will Dispose of the Thousand Islands.

A Liberal Proposal Voted Down by 32 of a Party Majority.

Mr. Charlton's Sunday Bill Killed by the Senate—23 to 13.

(Special to the ADVERTISER.)

OTAWA, June 15.—In the Commons on motion to go into committee of supply Sir Richard Cartwright drew attention to the advertisement stating that the Thousand Islands would be sold by private sale at an upset price on July 2. He protested against selling 700 or 800 islands by piecemeal at auction when the Ontario Government was willing to purchase them en bloc and preserve them as a natural park. He held the view strongly that it would be a mistake to part with these islands to individual purchasers, who would in most cases be wealthy Americans, and for one, he did not care to see the American flag on both sides of the river for 40 miles. It would only cost \$2,000 or \$4,000 a year for Canada to extinguish the Indian title for the islands. He moved in amendment "That the House has learned with surprise of the intention of the Government to dispose forthwith of the remainder of the Thousand Islands by private tender; that in the opinion of this House the present is not an opportune time for disposing of the said islands, and further, in view of the proposition submitted by the Government of Ontario to purchase the same for the purpose of converting them into a national park for the benefit of the people of Canada, it is expedient that no further action be taken."

Mr. Daly said that the Ontario Government could come in and tender for the islands if they choose, but Mr. Laurier pointed out that the Ontario Government could not obtain an appropriation from the Legislature until next winter, but that if the Dominion Government had promptly acted on their offer when it was made during the last session of the Legislature the appropriation could have been got. Mr. Laurier dwelt on the desirability of securing for the people this great natural park in all its beauty.

Sir John Thompson, who was in a very bad humor over the matter and sneered at the motives and opinions of Sir Richard Cartwright, contended that if the Province of Ontario was going to acquire the islands it would not be necessary for Canada to spend \$70,000 in doing so, especially as it would only benefit Ontario. This narrow view of a great question was repudiated by one of the Premier's own supporters, Dr. Weldon, of Alberta, who declared that, speaking for one of the other provinces of Canada, he was in favor of the amendment of Sir Richard Cartwright, though he might be compelled to vote with the Government on a motion of want of confidence. Dr. Weldon was our great national waterway and one of the most famous rivers in the world—in fact, it was the noblest rivers in the world—and he sincerely hoped the Government would not insist on parting with these beautiful islands to private parties for the sake of a petty \$4,000 a year.

On a division Sir Richard Cartwright's motion was rejected by 32 to 64—a Government party majority of 32.

The House then went into committee of supply.

NOTES.

In the Senate to-day Mr. Bowell announced the death of Senator Billia Flint, who died at noon to-day in this city.

Mr. Charlton's Sunday bill was given the six months hoist on motion of Senator Almon by a vote of 22 to 13.
