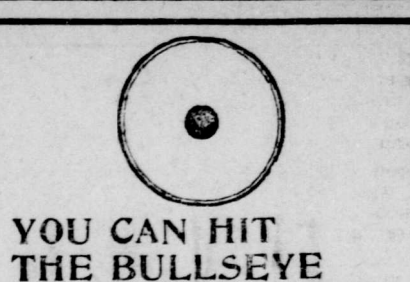

METEOROLOGICAL

Toronto, Sept. 24, 8 p.m.—A storm of great severity is centered tonight in Manitoba. Heavy rain is falling from the Rockies to Lake Superior, accompanied by very high winds. From the lower lakes to the Maritime Provinces the weather has been fine, but it soon promises to change. Gales are indicated at once for the lakes, the hardest blow being likely to occur from the westward. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 48-61; Kamloops, 46-60; Calgary, 28-38; Qu'Appelle, 48-59; Winnipeg, 54-64; Port Arthur, 44-58; Parry Sound, 44-72; Toronto, 50-71; Ottawa, 50-72; Montreal, 54-72; Quebec, 48-68; Halifax, 50-64.

Local temperature—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Monday, Sept. 24, were 74 and 41 degrees.

Today (Tuesday) the sun rose at 6:07 a.m., and sets at 6:12 p.m. The moon rose at 7:57 a.m., and sets at 6:42 p.m.

Neither did he think the relations between himself and Joseph Sifton important enough to render these witnesses imperative. He conceded the importance of the medical testimony to be adduced, but said that the defense were worse off than the crown in the respect of securing expert testimony. However, owing to the serious nature of the case, he would not press anything against a postponement.

Mr. Justice Rose said that the case was one of the gravest character, and the prisoner should be afforded every opportunity for clearing himself. If he erred, he would rather it be on the side of allowing the defense every possible opportunity to perfect itself; for if he erred on the other side, it would be a mistake not easily rectified. In conclusion, he said that in the event of a true bill being found, if the application for postponement were renewed it would be not unfavorably received.
