Oats were a shade lower, \$1.00 to
90c, but they are still easily affected,
any little rush of deliveries pushing the
price down. No other kinds of grain
offered.

The receipts of hay were fairly
good, but not so much as last week.
Prices were a little higher, at \$7.50 to
\$8, and closing steady.

Dressed hogs were high during the
first three days of the week, sales
ranging from \$3 to \$3.25, but a little
later on prices declined to \$2.75 to \$3,
and indications are for still further
reductions in prices.

The live hog market was also easier,
sales at Monday's session being made
at \$6.25.

The commander of the British first-
class cruiser Undaunted has landed
large supplies of rifles and ammuni-
tions, and guns have been placed in
position at commanding points, with
the result that the foreigners are con-
fident they can overcome any attack
on the settlement, into which the for-
eigners from the out-stations are rap-
idly congregating.

RUSSIANS HAVE NO PICNIC.

According to a dispatch from New
Chwang, the Russians there are bare-
ly able to cope with the situation. The
Chinese, it appears, are burning all the
railroad material, killing isolated Rus-
sians at every opportunity, and de-
stroying the coal mines.

The St. James Gazette expresses the
opinion that China is "teaching Amer-
ica a lesson in the art of avoiding im-
perialism," adding:
"America's experience will teach her it
is not the desire to grab distant lands,
but to drive Great Britain forward."

Washington, June 27.—The Chinese
minister has just received a telegram
from Pekin, via Chung Fu, dated June
19, saying that the ministers and for-
eigners in Pekin were safe there, and
well, and that arrangements were be-
ing made to provide them with an es-
cort out of the city.

THE RELIEF OF TIEN TSIN.

London, June 27.—A special dispatch
from Che Foo says: The fight of the
allied forces against the combined Box-
ers and Chinese soldiers, barring the
road to Tien Tsin, opened at day-
break. One hundred and fifty Amer-

ican soldiers were killed, and the re-
maining forces were driven back to the
city.

profound respect and loyalty. They unite
in saying 'God Save the Queen.'"

**ON THE WHOLE
ENCOURAGING**

Summary of the Latest Dispatches
From the Orient.

London, June 27.—2:03 p.m.—The
cable messages from the far east to-
day are so conflicting in their tenor
that almost any desired view of the
situation is deducible therefrom. On
the whole, however, the news is en-
couraging, and it seems safe to assume
that Vice-Admiral Seymour and the
legations, whether together or sepa-
rately, will ultimately reach a place of
safety. Various reports locate the
legations at diverse places, but it
seems agreed that they are safely
away from Pekin.

The latest Shanghai report says that
Prince Tuan (the head of the Chinese
foreign office, and father of the heir
apparent) has sent the legations to
Sian Fu under escort, and adds that
Sian Fu will be the new capital, in-
stead of having been occupied by the
international forces.

Admiral Seymour, it is asserted,
succeeded in getting a message into
Tien Tsin on Monday, according to
which he was then eight miles from
the city. The message, it is said, could
only have been delivered after he had
killed another two days, and had 63
killed and over 200 wounded. He did
not mention the ministers or others
from Pekin.

It is thought at Shanghai that now
the result is relieved the combined in-
ternational forces will have no great
difficulty in reaching Pekin, though it
is expected it will be found that all
the foreigners have left already.

**REPORTS OF DAMAGE HIGHLY
COLORED.**

It is claimed that the reports as to
the damage done at Tien Tsin and
the casualties among the foreign res-
idents have been highly colored.

The exodus of Chinese from Shanghai
is unabated. Every steamer is thronged,
and the authorities have been ob-
liged to resort to the use of the fire
hose to prevent the fugitives from
overcrowding the vessels.
