WINONA'S MAIDEN CRUISE

Pleasant Trip From Port Stanley to Rondeau and Return.

New Pleasure Boat a Commodious and Comfortable Craft.

Fair weather and an unruffled sea favored the first extended trip on Lake Erie of the new boat Winona, recently built and launched at Port Stanley by the well-known lake navigator, Capt. John Ellison. The captain invited a number of his friends, including several London people, to accompany him on a trip from Port Stanley to Rondeau and return. The party were on board the new boat early Monday morning, and at 7 o'clock they started up the lake for the little harbor whose name has recently been associated with all sorts of possibilities as a depot and distributing point for the coal shipped across the lake from Ontario to the Canadian side. The run from Port Stanley to Rondeau was a pleasant one, and occupied about four hours. The weather—already hinted—was not of a character to put the Winona's sea-sickness quality to a full test, but she gave ample evidence of being a first-class sailer, speedy and easy to handle. Her machinery gave good satisfaction, and when it has been used a little more will doubtless work to perfection. Rondeau was reached about 11 o'clock, and those who chose to go ashore had ample time to learn the charms of the place, do some fishing and enjoy the pleasure of bathing in the lake.

At 4 p.m. the Winona started eastward, and Port Stanley was reached about 7 p.m. The skipper, Capt. Ellison, who is justly proud of his new craft, was very attentive to his guests, and the trip was much enjoyed by all. The new boat is well advanced toward completion, and will have all the modern fittings and conveniences. She is staunch and trim, about 2 feet wider and 7 feet longer than the Joe Milton. The Winona is intended to be used as an excursion boat, either for picnic parties at the Port, or for excursions up and down and across the lake, and in her construction everything has been done to insure the safety and comfort of her passengers.

Corrie, Twenty-seventh Regiment; Second Lieutenant J. C. Elliott, Twenty-sixth Regiment; Lieutenant D. Fraser, Twenty-fifth Regiment; Lieutenant W. W. MacVicar, Thirty-third Regiment; Lieutenant P. H. Campbell, Eighty-second Regiment; Second Lieutenant J. P. McPeake, Seventy-first Regiment.

The special month's course in manual training for school teachers in connection with Sir W. C. MacDonald scheme closed today. W. H. Leck, superintendent of the work for Ontario, said that he had had experience in England, Sweden, Germany and other European countries, and that he had never seen work superior to that done by the Canadians. The class embraced students from all parts of the Dominion, seventy being in attendance.

1,000 SOLDIERS REACH HALIFAX. Halifax, N. S., July 29.—The Leyland steamer Cestrian, from Port Natal, South Africa, July 2, via St. Vincent, C. V. I., arrived here at 4:30 this afternoon. The steamer had 1,639 officers and passengers, and the work of paying them off was commenced as soon as the steamer came to anchor. Ten men are discharged irregulars.

Women of 41 men of the Second Canadian Mounted Rifles also came on the Cestrian. The men will be landed in the morning and entrained for the West.
