RISKED HIS LIFE TO EASE DYING

Surgeon Crawls Under Overturned Car to Administer an Opiate.

New York, Nov. 24.—Out from under a tilted car at Third avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-second street last night Dr. Henry Krauskoop, a Harlem Hospital ambulance surgeon, crawled on his hands and knees, his white duck coat with its Red Cross chevron was soiled and torn. While he rose from his feet cheer on cheer went up from a big crowd. The young surgeon had done a brave thing. The car had struck a man. His body was so tightly wedged under the wheels that it could not be dragged out. The poor fellow's shrieks of pain rent the air when the ambulance arrived. A policeman told the surgeon they had tried hard but could not lift the car and get the man out. The surgeon quickly produced a glistering little instrument—a hypodermic syringe. He charged it with a strong dose of opiate, then he crawled under the car.

He could not tell whether what he was to do would save the man's life. But he did know that he could stop the frightful agony. Under the tangled machinery he made his way to the man. A swift motion of his hand and the soothing opiate shot through the man's body. His groans ceased. The surgeon had brought him merciful unconsciousness.

The car moved slightly. The policeman sprang on the ground, calling: "Doctor, come out now. You've done your best. I'm afraid the car will settle at any minute. You'll be crushed to death. Here, take my hand and I'll help you."

"I belong right here where I am," replied the surgeon. "Please get me a lamp and tell the driver to push my instrument case under the car to clear the lamp and case were thrust under the car, and the surgeon worked with swift, skillful hands bandaging the almost unconscious man. He bandaged the crushed head, too, and otherwise stopped the flow of blood from the worst wounds. Then the wrecking wagon came and the car was lifted clear of the wounded man and the surgeon.

"Hurry, old man!" the doctor shouted to the driver after the injured man was placed in the ambulance. The driver drove off amid the cheers of the spectators. The injured man died at the hospital two hours later. He was not identified.

BATTLE OF INKPOTS

Row Between Italian Counsel Starts a Fustilage.

Rome, Nov. 24.—A suit brought by former Minister Bettolo against Deputy Ferri, editor of the Avanti (Socialist), who accused the minister of using his influence to obtain large orders for a firm in which he is interested, and thus provoking Bettolo's fall from power, has been in progress here for a week past, and is now attracting even more interest than before.

Signor Ferri protested indignantly, whereupon Signor Vettori, one of Bettolo's legal advisers, called him a "rascal." Another deputy, Signor Comandini, one of the counsel, retorted, the sage best of all, by replying to the lawyers "cowards," whereupon Vettori threw an inkstand in the face of Comandini, covering him with ink and breaking one of his teeth.

ONTARIO'S CROPS SATISFACTORY

Though Not So Large as Last Year's Yield.

SOME GOVERNMENT STATISTICS

Largely Increased Area of Wheat-Sown Land—Damage By Hessian Fly.

Toronto, Nov. 23.—The last crop report for the Province of Ontario for the year 1903 has been issued by the department of agriculture. The year has been on the whole a satisfactory one. There has been great advancement in every line of farm improvements. The final estimates have been compiled from the actual yield made by the threshers, and the extra 2,665,965 acres of wheat, 248,818 acres of barley, 709,839 acres of oats, 247,831 bushels, or 34.3 bushels per acre. Hay, 407,123 acres, 8,924,620 bushels, or 49.9 bushels per acre. Rye, 170,277 acres, 2,970,768 bushels, or 17.5 bushels per acre. Spring wheat, 248,818 acres, 4,949,233 bushels, or 19.9 bushels per acre. Barley, 709,839 acres, 24,783,311 bushels, or 34.3 bushels per acre. Oats, 247,831 acres, 110,228,102 bushels, or 41.7 bushels per acre. Rye, 170,277 acres, 2,970,768 bushels, or 17.5 bushels per acre. Peas, 407,123 acres, 8,924,620 bushels, or 49.9 bushels per acre. Buckwheat, 95,487 acres, 2,049,109 bushels, or 21.5 bushels per acre. Beans, 53,639 acres, 975,246 bushels, or 18.4 bushels per acre. Potatoes, 139,011 acres, 16,675,447 bushels, or 120 bushels per acre. Corn for husking, 564,400 tons, or 12.23 tons per acre. Hay and clover, 2,733,565 tons, or 4.385 tons, or 156 tons per acre. Apples, 43,659,413 bushels, or 6.15 bushels per tree of bearing age. Tobacco, 2,438,021 pounds.

There has been a greatly increased area of wheat sown this fall, more particularly in the Lake Erie division and other localities where the Hessian fly did so much injury during the previous three or four years. The seed was generally reported as being in good condition, which gave the crop a good start, and at the end of October the young wheat was presenting a fine appearance in most places, although some fields were showing need of rain. Some injury from the Hessian fly was reported, but not as much as in the previous three or four years. Forty varieties of fall wheat are sown in Ontario. Dawson's Golden Chaff being the most popular, and Red Clawson coming next.

EMPEROR TO GO SOUTH

To Escape From Rigid Climate of Germany.

Berlin, Nov. 24.—Emperor William may spend a portion of the winter in a southern climate.
