Montreal, Aug. 18.-It became known here today that the secret service department of the C. P. R., under the direction of Mr. Dunlop, the claims agent, had unearthed a gigantic swindling system, by which, it is claimed, large Canadian corporations have been systematically bled for years. Immediate action will be taken by the company to break up the organization, and some sensational developments are expected within

The heads of the organization are said to be a number of wealthy Hebrews, and their system is to employ people to fake up accidents and put in claims to large Canadian corporations, themselves getting a certain share of the profits, but the organization getting the biggest slice in return for supplying paid
