Hiltz, Sunday school secretary for the Dominion; "Normal Training of the Sunday School Teacher," by Dr. Silcox, principal of the Stratford Normal School; "The Prayer Book in the Sunday School," by Canon Dyson Hague; "Conditions of Success in the Sunday School," by Rev. C. R. Gounne, M.A., Clinton; and "Boy Scouts and the Sunday Schools," by Rev. S. S. Hardy, of Woodstock.

The last paper very ably considered the Boy Scouts movement and its connection with the Sunday school and the church brigade.

The fifth Oxford Marathon attracted a large crowd to Woodstock on Monday afternoon, and once more the honours came to Ingersoll through Sammy Wade, the speedy little Scotch shoemaker, winning the coveted prize the second time consecutively, having won it last year. Distance, 10 miles; time, 56 minutes, 50.5 seconds. In 1906, Leslie Daniels, of Ingersoll, was the winner of the trophy in the first Oxford Marathon; then Garnet Elliott, of Ingersoll, won it; Tillsonburg's plucky runner, Willie Law, landed the prize in 1908, and in 1909 and 1910 the Ingersoll boy, Sammy Wade, captured it, so that Ingersoll now has the credit of four wins out of five. Wade was given a magnificent reception on his return to his home town.

SCULPTOR DEAD

John A. Acton Dies at His Home in London, England.

London, Oct. 31.—John Adams Acton, the sculptor, died today. He was born at Acton, Middlesex, and married Marion Hamilton, the authoress, whose pen name was "Jeanie Hering."

He was a pupil of Gibson for ten years, and had made many busts and statues. These were busts of Queen Alexandra and King George when the latter was Prince of Wales, a colossal statue of Sir Titus Salt, the Wesley memorial in Westminster Abbey, Cruikshanks in St. Paul's Cathedral, Bishop Waldegrave in Carlisle Cathedral, Sir David Carmichael and various statues and busts for America and India and the British provinces, as well as statues of Gladstone for Liverpool and Blackburn, Lord Beaconsfield, Queen Victoria for Kingston, and a statue of Queen Victoria for the Bahamas.

DROPPED DEAD.

Listowel, Oct. 31.—Charles Gowans, an old resident of Listowel, died very unexpectedly here today. He was spreading gravel on the road, and suddenly while leaning on his shovel, fell over and was picked up dead.
