TORONTO, Oct. 7.—The run at the Union stockyards yesterday totaled 187 cars, containing 400 cattle, 10 calves, 100 pigs and 322 sheep. The lambs were a result of the new tariff regulations brought into effect by the signing of the Anglo-American trade agreement. The cattle market today began to soar, and before the close at noon prices averaging \$10.00 to \$10.50. The sheep and pig prices were paid for practically all grades of cattle. When the market opened, trade was not active, but as the day wore on, buyers nor the deniers apparently realizing where they stood, and it was some time before it could be determined whether the price would be a small fall. It was, however, quickly seen that cattle
