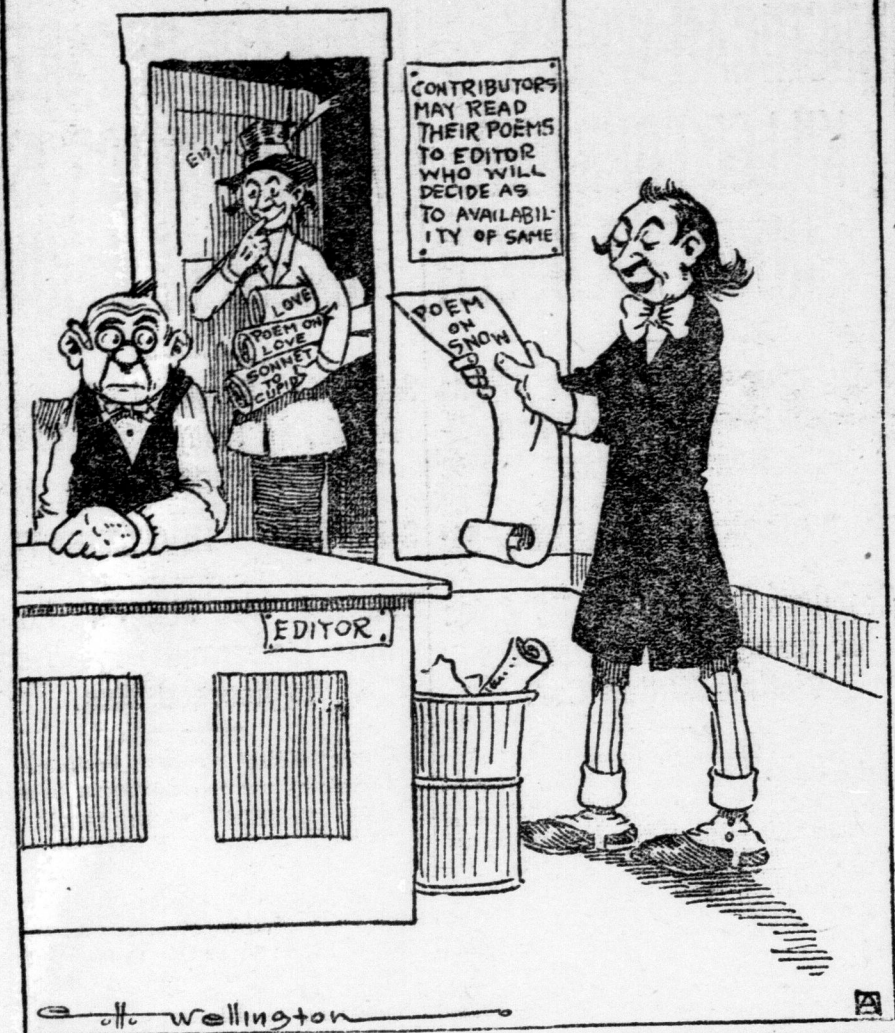


---and the Worst Is Yet to Come

PRESIDENT HUERTA
DECLINES TO YIELD

Friends and Church Officials
Are Unable to Move Him—
Is Fighting Against Odds.

Mexico City, Jan. 25.—President Huerta betrays no sign of yielding, although he is cognizant of the increase in the strength of his enemies intriguing with capital, and those in the hands of the United States. He is handicapped by inability to procure money and is confronted with Washington's determination that he must retire from Mexico's affairs.

Personal and political friends and the highest officials of the Catholic Church in Mexico, who have been endeavoring by methods, for the most part discreetly indirect, to bring about his elimination, are seemingly convinced tonight that they have failed.

General Huerta talks optimistically of the outlook, displays pride in the size of his army, which he estimates at considerably more than 100,000, and appears to believe that in spite of all obstacles and reverses, he will be able to dominate the situation within three months. It is conceded here that ex-Minister Flores Magón has failed in his mission to Mr. Lind at Vera Cruz, and that the United States will listen to no proposition short of the unconditional elimination of Huerta.

Treasury Is Empty.
No one—not even President Huerta—attempts to disguise the fact that the Mexican treasury is practically empty. In the capital, the Government payrolls are being liquidated with reasonable promptness, but it is no secret that the diplomatic representatives and consuls abroad in many cases have not been paid for weeks, and that the troops outside the capital often receive their pay long after it is due. In most cases these funds are derived from local sources; sometimes they are from forced loans levied on the inhabitants where the troops happen to be stationed.

Extraordinary taxes have been levied in the capital, as well as outside points, and there are rumors that other decrees are soon to be issued that will exact still greater tribute from the people.

Another Rebel Uprising.
There is little change of importance since last week in the military situation, and the residents of the capital are expecting that the rebel chief, General Villa, who has appeared outside Torreón, will reach here at an early date. One of the disquieting developments has been the increased number of rebel bands between Orizaba and Vera Cruz, and south as far as the Isthmus of Tehuantepec.

There are some who believe that General Felix Diaz and General Mondragon, his chief lieutenant in the uprising in the capital almost a year ago, are behind this latest rising. The rebels in this region have not been called upon so far to test the strength

EARNEST PRAYERS FOR
ABOLISHING THE BAR

Huron County Roused As Never
Before—Preachers Made
Temperance Their Theme.

Goderich, Jan. 25.—Earnest prayers
for the abolition of the bars all through
Huron and the stamping out of the
entire liquor traffic, were offered up in
the churches all through the county
today.

Temperance workers are roused as
never before, and the greatest victory
ever won in Ontario, if not in Canada,
is expected when the returns are in
next Thursday night.

Practically every pastor in Goderich
made the temperance issue his theme
today, and many splendid sermons
dealing with the question in all its
various phases were given. Every
church where the big question was to
be discussed was crowded to its
capacity.

Record Vote Expected.

A record vote is predicted on polling
day. The temperance forces are thor-
oughly organized and expect a sweep-
ing victory. Notwithstanding all that
has been done the present week will
be the most strenuous of the campaign.
A splendid series of meetings has
been arranged, and dozens of the
speakers of the temperance forces will
travel over Huron urging that all bars
be wiped out.

FOSTER SUMMONED
TO AID OF PARTY

Called Back To Help Argument
In Behalf of Tariff—Will
Be In House Today.

Ottawa, Jan. 25.—Hon. George E.
Foster will be in the House of Com-
mons tomorrow. He was summoned
to return from England to take part in
the discussion of the high cost of liv-
ing which developed in importance
last week and promises to continue
the most complete and quiet before
parliament throughout the session.

It is understood that the demand for
Mr. Foster's presence in parliament
came from the protected interests, who
feared that the members of the Gov-
ernment now here would not be able
to efficiently present their case. Though
Premier Borden, Finance Minister
White and Hon. Mr. Loughheed last
week stated that there was no inclin-
ation on the part of the Government
to remedy the high cost of living by
tariff readjustment they gave few
reasons to justify a stand-pat tariff
policy during hard times. The high
protectionists want their case sup-
ported by capable arguments. Hence
the hurried recall of Hon. Mr. Foster.

It is understood that a French mem-
ber is to be added to the commission
recently named to inquire into the
reasons for the high cost of living.
Reaches Ottawa at Midnight.

Hon. George E. Foster returned to
Ottawa at midnight. He left the day
after Christmas and has been in Lon-
don for a fortnight attending sittings of
the Dominion's royal trade commission.
The commission has gone to South
Africa, where they will sit without Mr.
Foster, who had to return to Canada
to appear in Parliament. In South
Africa the commission will take its
first evidence on the question of ocean
freight rates. As soon as the African
sittings are concluded, the commission
will come to Canada, where Mr. Fos-
ter will join them. The commission
will spend three months in Canada,
and, among other matters relating to
trade, will look into ocean freight rates
on both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

HOME RULE BILL
A LAW THIS YEAR

Prediction of John E. Red-
mond, Nationalist
Leader.

Waterford, Ireland, Jan. 25.—"Every
sane man knows that, bar accidents,
the home rule bill will be the law of
the land this year," said John E. Red-
mond, leader of the Irish Nationalists,
speaking before an immense gathering
here this afternoon.

"If any change is made in the home
rule bill," continued Mr. Redmond, "it
will only be to buy the goodwill of our
opponents. But I say frankly that I see
no prospects of their goodwill being
purchased at any price whatever. That
goodwill is worth purchasing at a big
price, but any change in the bill should
be consistent with the unity of Ire-
land. There are no lengths short of
abandonment of the principles you and
I hold to which I would not go to gain
the confidence of the men of Ulster."

Opposes Fight in Cork.
Referring to William O'Brien's resig-
nation from his seat in Cork, Mr. Red-
mond asked his supporters to refrain
from contesting the seat declaring that
a fight between two professing Nation-
alists at the present moment would be
a scandal and an injury to the cause.

Mr. O'Brien resigned his seat in
Parliament a week ago in answer to a
challenge issued by Augustine Rooke,
M. P. for North Louth, to test the
strength of his following. He declared
his readiness to meet any member of
the Irish party from John Redmond
down, as the opposing candidate, to de-
cide whether the home rule bill as it
now stands is acceptable to the Irish
people.

ALFONSO TO CROSS THE SEA.
Madrid, Jan. 25.—Announcement is made
in several of the Madrid newspapers of
King Alfonso's projected trip to Argen-
tina.

Premier Dato is given as authority for
the report. It was said tonight that the
cabinet has made no definite arrange-
ments for the trip.
