Bombs Dropped On Several Villages In North of England.

CANADIANS GAVE VALUABLE HELP AT THE BATTLE OF NEUVE CHAPELLE

LONDON, April 14.—The following appears in Sir John French's dispatch issued today regarding operations in France: "On the 15th of February the Canadian division began to arrive in this country. I inspected the division which was under the command of Lieut.-Gen. Alderson on February 20. They presented a splendid, most soldier-like appearance on parade; the men were of good physique, hard and fit. I judged by what I saw of them that they were well trained and quite able to take their places in the line of battle. Since then the division has thoroughly justified the good opinion I formed of it.

"The troops of the Canadian division were first attached for a few days by brigades for training in the third corps trenches under Lieut.-Gen. Sir William Pulteney, who gave me such excellent reports of their efficiency that I was able to employ them in the trenches early in March. During the battle of Neuve Chapelle they held part of the line allotted to the first army, and although they were not actually engaged in the main attack they ren-

dered valuable help by keeping the enemy actively employed in front of their trenches. "All the soldiers of Canada serving in the army under my command have so far splendidly upheld the traditions of the empire, and will, I feel sure, prove to be a great source of additional strength to the forces in this country."
