STRATFORD STORE IS SWEPT BY FIRE

Powder Explosion Shattered Plate Glass Front of Hardware.

STRATFORD, Aug. 10 .- Fire of unknown origin broke out in the store of the Stratford Hardware Company on Wellington street about 5 o'clock this afternoon, and during the best part of the hour it raged the flames swept through practically the entire store. Water did heavy damage to the adjoin ing stores of F. J. Whitmore, book seller, the Myers Hardware Company and Huoson's billiard parlers.

The fire apparently had considerable start before it was discovered. Owing to the Wednesday afternoon half-holiday, the store was closed at 1 o'clock. H. S. Schmidt, proprietor of the Stratford Hardware Company, stated to The Advertiser that there had not been any light or fire in the store. He left about 1 o'clock.

When noticed the flames and smoke were pouring out of windows in the third story. No estimate of the loss is available tonight, but it will be heavy. It will be covered by insurance. It is believed the fire started in the cellar or at the back of Schmidt's store. An elevator shaft provided a ready passage for the flames, which swept up to the second and third floors. The firemen had hardly arrived on

the scene when there was an explosion. A small keg of powder had been received in the morning and this is believed to have caused the explosion The force of the impact shattered the plate glass windows at the front of the store, scattering the glass over the road. Three firemen were just about to enter the store when the explosion occurred, and they were thrown back onto the pavement.

Stock Not Heavy.

The fire was practically confined to the second and third floors. Mr. Schmidt's stock at this time was not particularly heavy. There was very little on the third floor, but on the second floor a considerable quantity of glass was stored. The straw in which this was packed caused very dense smoke. The damage to the main part of the store was entirely from the
