

FOUR HUNDRED GIRLS RALLY AT THAMES PARK

Saturday's Gathering Is But the
Beginning—Sunday Will
See 800 Girls Assembled.

GIRLS: Four hundred, happy, smartly-uniformed girls! Such will be the sight presented at Thames Park on Saturday afternoon when the 'teen age girls of the city will hold their annual rally there. Meeting at Thames Park at 2:30 o'clock, the girls will form up in companies and pass before the reviewing judges. The result will be the election of the group, which presents the best all-around appearance. Attendance, general neatness of uniform and the best song embodying the idea of the group will be considered by the judges.

A feature of the afternoon will be the awarding of pennants for the best year's work, the judges in this connection being Miss Hilda Keene, Mrs. John Detwiler, Mrs. C. H. Hill, Miss Helen Davidson. Two pennants will be presented, one to the best intermediate group and one to the best senior group.

An award will be made to the group presenting the best budget for a family of five. The groups have been asked to consider the situation confronting a mother with four children, whom she must support. The object is to suggest the means of livelihood and how the family finances are to be spent.

A splendid program of games has been arranged for the afternoon by Miss Holland, Miss McPherson, Miss Jackson and Miss Morgan. The games for the juniors will include circle tag ball, pie-plate relay, circle stride ball, crows and crows and bringing home the colors. The seniors' games will be zig-zag pass, ball ball, pass the ball relay, chair race and bringing home the colors.
