## CITIZENS RESPOND TO BOARD APPEAL FOR VACCINATION

**Vaccine Sufficient To Inoculate 8,500 Given Out by Health Institute.**

**SUBMIT HEALTH REPORT**

At the monthly meeting of the board of health held at the city hall last night a considerable amount of business was gone over. It was decided that the recommendation for the sewer from Wellington to Waterloo on Cheapside go through. The members also decided on a type of bubbler for drinking fountains. The action of the medical officer of health, Dr. W. S. Downham, was heartily commended and approved of in every way in his methods regarding smallpox and scarlet fever. The reports of Dr. Tamlin, dairy inspector, and R. H. Saunders, sanitary inspector, were also highly recommended.

The report of the tuberculosis clinic for the month of March showed two new cases for reserved diagnosis and five cases non-tuberculous. The total number of patients at the dispensary was 116. The number of deaths, 2.

Dr. W. S. Downham reported two cases of smallpox under quarantine. Both cases have been of several weeks' duration and one will likely be released this week. No new cases have been reported for two weeks.

He recommended that provision be made for a place to take care of cases of smallpox that might develop in hotels or boarding-houses, as there is at the present time no place to take care of such cases.

It was shown that the efforts to get people vaccinated voluntarily is meeting with success. The Institute of Public Health has given out to city physicians sufficient vaccine to vaccinate 8,400 persons. In addition to this some vaccine made by drug firms has been used. The medical officer of health has vaccinated 470 persons.

While there are still several cases of scarlet fever, the disease has declined from 25 to 15. There are two the number of cases in the fever

ward of Victoria Hospital has declined considerably. In two weeks cases of diphtheria, a few of chicken-pox and a fairly large number of measles.

The report of the communicable diseases for March shows: Diphtheria 19, scarlet fever 177, chicken-pox 244, whooping cough 7, tuberculosis 43, mumps 43, measles 1,412, smallpox 4, pneumonia 2.

## 10,000 MINERS REFUSE TO REPORT FOR WORK

**Negotiations Between Officials and Coal Operators' Representatives Broken Off.**

Louisville, Ky., April 14.—Negotiations between officials of district 23, U. M. W., and representatives of the West Kentucky Coal Operators' Association, over a new wage scale, were broken off today. Union officials said approximately 10,000 miners would not report for work tomorrow.

## CANADA'S NET DEBT QUESTIONED IN HOUSE

**Acting Minister of Finance Declares Montreal Quotations Are Wrong.**

Ottawa, April 14.—A circular issued by the Montreal Board of Trade, placing Canada's net debt at \$3,513,000,000 was subject of a question in the House of Commons this afternoon. The acting minister of finance replied that the actual net debt of Canada estimated for the budget, is \$2,423,567,759.
