## ASK CADET ISSUE BE CONSIDERED

London Mothers Would Bring Matter Before Ontario Federation.

At the annual meeting of the Ontario home and school council, to be held in Toronto Easter week, a request from the London union mothers' club will be read urging the meeting to discuss the topic of cadet training and in this way obtain an idea of how the mothers' clubs of the province stand on the matter.

The London club has not taken any definite stand on the question, some members being in favor of cadet training and others being opposed. The subject of furnishing the cadets with uniforms out of the school funds will also be discussed.

Another subject the London club wishes discussed is teaching of temperance in the schools. Just how much about temperance is being taught in the schools at the present time is not known and further data on the subject is desired.

Mrs. W. A. Tanner, president, and Mrs. A. Drew, secretary, were appointed delegates to represent the London club at the annual meeting.

## CHILD PSYCHOLOGY IS SUBJECT OF ADDRESS

Miss Marion Royce Speaks Before Women of Christ Disciples Church.

"Child Psychology" was the interesting topic of a fascinating address given at a meeting of the mothers and young women of the Church of Christ, Disciples, yesterday by Miss Marion Royce, young people's secretary for Canada for the Church of Christ, Disciples.

The keynote of Miss Royce's address was the best manner in which different types of children should be dealt with, and the women received much helpful information from her remarks. Contrary to the popular idea of crossing the schemes of the self-willed child, Miss Royce made other statements, for she feels that too much of this has been done in the past and that in many ways, lacking will of any kind, have resulted.

When a child has a sense of humor, the speaker would not suppress it. Instead, she would guide it carefully so that the child does not become cynical and sarcastic. She has pity for the shy child, and suggested that the mother should follow their interest and draw them out in the presence of outsiders so that consciousness of self is forgotten.

The would-be martyr child was the other variety of children emphasized by Miss Royce. She said the children who are constantly giving in and sacrificing for others and demand no return. She declared that it is a good trait, but can easily be overdone, and that early in life they must be taught to accept as well as give favors.

Miss Grace H. Versey occupied the chair and introduced the speaker.

## WHITE FEATURES SOUTHERN GOWNS

Trend of Style at Palm Beach Points to Simplicity For Summer.

Palm Beach, March 24.—The fire at Palm Beach burned up a lot of good clothes, but it also obliterated many fashions that never would have been worn this summer in other parts of the country. To the extent that the owners are not sorry for the Florida season, now almost at its close, has given them a comparatively certain knowledge of what to buy and what not to buy for June and July in the north.

The striking feature of the late Florida trends of style is the predominance of white. The best dressed women here today are wearing light-colored frocks of white linen, soft white voile, or white tulle, with tastefully embroidered, their simplicity enhanced rather than destroyed by hand-drawn work and lace insets which adorn them.

Flirt and Irish lace are being extensively used as adornments for these charming day-time and evening frocks. Occasionally the sheer white voile dress is worn over a crepe de chine, georgette or satin slip of some bright color. This softens the effect of the white shade and still gives a luminous glow to the costume making the white voile seem almost lighted from within.

Combinations of white with other shades, are almost as popular. The most striking shade now in vogue is a tangerine, a reddish orange shade. In fact, the red tint so universal in lemon to a red can be seen in the clubs and hotels here. Tangerine scarfs are worn with white dresses and hats of the same color. Reddish orange shade are close rivals of the white head gear.

White shoes and white stockings have superseded the other shades. The flesh tint so universal in the north are seldom seen any longer on the Florida coasts. Combinations of white and tan are very swaggy, particularly the sandal type woven of alternate narrow stripes of white and tan leather in the evening.

The evening frocks worn for the most part are of white. On a basis of heavy white silk there is imposed a heavy mesh of white embroidery.

Evening dresses are also being made of white, but of whatever color they must, it is white.

This effect usually is attained by the use of beads. Side draperies are being extensively employed again, especially by women of the dowager type.

## VICTORIA HOSPITAL HAS TWO X-RAY PATIENTS DAILY

More than an average of two patients a day throughout the past year have made use of the new X-ray equipment at Victoria hospital installed one year ago.

The X-ray apparatus for fluoroscopic examinations and deep therapy treatment has been in constant use, as many as 33 patients having taken the latter form of treatment. More than 53 other types of X-ray treatment were also administered.

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
