"The first side for comparison is physical development. The boy must have courage to win the battle of life, and courage comes to a great extent, from strength. has a great advantage, if he uses he learns to play a different kind of game to develop each part of the body. He learns how to swim so that if at any time he is called upon to save his own life or that of another. in an accident on water, he is able. The city boy has the chance of becoming an all-round athlete through competition and a good sport through many defeats. The country boy has very few, if any, of these chances. He seldom has any time to play games and go swimming, as he has to work a great deal. When he does have time, he has no physical in structor to teach him the best ways to get the most out of his muscles

through less exertion.
Spiritual Development. "The next side for comparison is spiritual development. In this case I would say that the advantages the has over the country boy are many. The city boy, through coming in contact with much more evil than the country boy, learns through experience to go along straight road, lifting himself above that evil and therefore strengthening his character. The country boy, coming in contact with the evils of the city, does not learn to comba-them. The city boy joins numerous Y. M. C. A.
