



PRINTING BUREAU THEFTS LAID

OTTAWA, June 25.—Efforts of Dominion police to locate E. G. Britte, purchasing agent of the Government Printing Bureau, have failed, but a description circuit has been sent to all the cities of United States, and they hope to of his capture soon.
