THE KING'S BIRTHDAY

OTTAWA, May 28.—The birthday of
King George V., June 3, will be a
statutory holiday in Canada, although
in view of His Majesty's proclama-
tion that he would follow the preced-
ent of King Edward and keep May 24
as the empire's general holiday in hon-
or of the sovereign, there will be no
general observance of next Friday as
a holiday. Being a statutory holiday,
all banks will be closed, thus making
the third bank holiday within two
weeks.

The cabinet council yesterday de-
cided that no proclamation should be
issued to extend Friday next from the
provision of the bills of exchange act,
which declares that the king's
birthday shall be a statutory holiday.

HOTEL MAN ENDS HIS LIFE IN SENSATIONAL MANNER THIS MORNING

Cut His Throat With Sword While Temporarily Insane

--Little Cause Given For Rash Act.

INQUEST TO-NIGHT

W. R. Riddell, proprietor of the
Strathmore Hotel, committed suicide
at an early hour this morning.

Last night when he retired he lock-
ed himself in his room, and it was
during the early morning that some-
one's screams were heard issuing from
his apartments. The door could not
be forced and a ladder was secured

and entrance made by the window.
When discovered it was found that he
had cut a deep gash in his throat with
a sword which hung in his room.

Medical aid was at once summoned
but despite all that could be done he
passed away a short time after being
found.

In their sad affliction Mrs. Riddell
and children have the sympathy of all
deceased was about forty six years of
age. The only cause assigned for
his rash act is that he lost a suit pend-
ing against him, decision being given
yesterday, and that he was tempo-
rarily unaccountable for his actions.

An inquest was held at noon, and
adjourned until the evening.

another column, she was met by a com-
mable who would not permit her to
leave the train, and consequently was
obliged to come here. Upon arrival of
the local express here Saturday they
were directed to the police station,
where they were looked after. Chief
Crawford was notified and at once
ordered supper for the family. He with
officer Brown took up a subscrip-
tion and collected twenty-seven dol-
lars for the unfortunate woman. The
children were in a pitiable condition
after their long journey and through
the kindness of Mrs. David Comby,
who lives over the police station, were
soon made comfortable. The Chief
gave up his office which was converted
into a bedroom and the family made
comfortable over Sunday. They left
on the local Monday morning, accom-
panied by L. C. B. Detective Noble for
Bathurst.
