Fredericton, Sept. 15-The Fredericton exhibition of 1913, the greatest held in the city since 1863, was formally declared open by Lieut. Governor Wood this evening. The exeremony took place in the amusement hall, and addresses were delivered by His Honor the Lieut. Governor, Hon. John Morrissy, Minister of Public Works, on behalf of the

. C. B. Hamilton-Gray, A. D. C., officer ommanding No. 3 station Canadian Regi-ment, and by Mr. W. M. Cruiksbank, private Members of the city council, city officials and officers of Agricultural Society, No. 34, by which the exhibition is held, occpied seats upon the platform.

Lieut, Governor Wood in opening expressed s pleasure at being called upon to formally on the exhibition. The occasion was of particular note, as it was the fiftieth anniversary of the Fredericton exhibition. The fair spoke well for the farmers of that portion of the province adjacent to the provincial capital.
