WILL BANQUET THE LIBERAL FIGHTERS

F. B. Carvell and L. A. Dugal Will be Tendered Banquet in Fredericton on Dec. 3rd.

In recognition of the splendid work done by L. A. Dugal, M.P., and F. B. Carvell, M.P., it has been decided by the leaders to tender them a banquet in the city of Fredericton on Thursday evening, December 3rd. It is expected that a large number will attend to do honor to the men who fought such a successful fight, risking their political reputations in the attempt to insure clean honest government in this province. CONVICTS CONDUCT OWN UPLIFT WORK

Unique Campaign in Joliet Prison

One of the most remarkable uplift campaigns ever begun is that of the convicts at Joliet, Ill., who are heading a movement for the co-operation of convicts in every prison to solve the great problem of the best means for a discharged prisoner to make an honest living. Declaring that the theorists have utterly failed to solve this problem, the Joliet Prison Post maintains that the prisoners themselves are capable of finding some solution.

The convicts point with pride to the achievements of the "University of Another Chance," where prisoners have proven they can be entrusted with their own government. This unique institution, which is in reality New Jersey's reformatory, reports that the prisoners govern themselves better than a host of guards could govern them. The spirit of self-reliance, of usefulness, of faith in the good will of their fellow-men has been preserved and strengthened behind the bars, and the convicts see the bright light of "the chance" looming in the horizon.

New Jersey's reformatory at Rahway is an institution where the prisoners study themselves. Doctor Frank Moore, the superintendent, tells his charges that his business is not to criticize the bad but to find the good and cultivate it. And so his scheme of giving the prisoners the power of self-government and self-discipline has worked out successfully. In two years the infractions of the prison's rules decreased from 4889 to 2887. The older inmates, who are working for the privilege of being treated like citizens, are seldom reported, and their conduct has done much to tame the new inmates.

PORT DANIEL
Mr. Nelson Horie returned on Tuesday from New Carlisle, where he had been storm stayed for some days.

On Friday a severe snow storm visited the coast. The lobster hatchery at Port Daniel suffered considerable damage. Hoeg's Lobster Factory was practically destroyed. Mr. P. Castiloux's house was washed off the foundation. Messrs. Thos. Meagher, Robert and John Sullivan had difficulty in saving their boats, which were hauled for the winter. The Eastbound train passed through about 4 p.m., but could only run to Chandler; while the westbound, which passed through about 6 p.m., was held up in Pasphebiac by a washout.

On Saturday morning, the Str. Essington of New York, which had been unloading at Chandler, was discovered aground on the sandbar here. In the afternoon when the tide had risen somewhat, the crew were able to get her off. It is supposed that the wharf light not having been lit was the cause of her running ashore.

A great deal of grumbling was done Friday evening, when persons calling at the Centre Post Office found that the carrier had gone down for the mail, but finding the beach impassable had returned home. Apparently the alternative of walking across the railway bridge had not occurred to him. Surely in an emergency like this the Railway Co. would not enforce the usual fine for crossing a railway bridge?

Mr. James Miller, acting for some of the large lumber companies, is buying up a great deal of pulpwood.

We greatly fear that there will be a scarcity of young men in the village after Capt. McKenzie's visit, as doubtless a large number will volunteer.

Mr. Philip Chabre of Gascons, who was in Port Daniel today, reported that two fishing boats had been lost there by the storm.

PASPEBIAC
Mr. T. C. LeBreton of Robin, Jones & Whitman, Bonaventure, was in town on the 23rd.

Mr. Stansby, traveller for Rylands, Manchester, Eng., arrived in Pasphebiac on Sunday 22nd.

Mr. W. F. Hamon and Mr. L. St. J. LeSeigneur, spent a few days in Cape Cove last week.

Mr. C. LeMarquand and Mr. Jas. LeBlack left last week to take up their duties down the coast, the former at Pabos, the latter at Fox River.

On Tuesday last the coast was visited by a very severe storm of snow and wind. Much damage was done by the tide rising and flooding the beach at the establishments of Robin, Jones & Whitman and LeBoutillier Bros. The water, which rose to about three feet, carried away quite a lot of lumber and overturned a few fishing buildings and destroyed many of the fishermen's boats. All outside communication was cut off by the telegraph and telephone, and the railway service was disorganized.

BEHIND THE SCENES WITH MISS ANGLIN

Talk With Canada's Leading Actress.

The very tall and dignified lady at the entrance to the theatre squelched the timid interviewer with one glance from her fine but scornful eyes. Up a dark side-aisle the coward fled, trying to assure herself that it was only a life-sized photograph after all. But it continued real, real, while she stumbled through by-ways and back ways of stageland, almost colliding with a lone and doleful tea-table, which glittered a lazy, silvery, but steamless, invitation to an unresponsive world of painted scenery, rolled-up rugs and hastening humans. The haughty eyes haunted her mazy course as far as a curtained doorway, from the other side of which a cordial voice said:

"Come in."

Then the haughty spectre of the theatre entrance was laid forever, and in its place stood a live, glowing woman, radiating warmth and graciousness from the coppery crown of her head to the rose-colored tip of her slipper. A small, black-barbed French maid hovered in the background, fastening a hook here and padding on a bit of powder there, while "the lady of the evening" chatted with her visitor and occasionally turned to give a suggestion in the language of her dresser.

For the first time, Miss Anglin said, she was playing the part of the mother of a big daughter, and a dubious little grimace questioned her quite happy acceptance of the role.

"But I couldn't have played Lady Windermere," she said. "It wouldn't have suited me at all."

The interviewer toyed with the banality of "a favorite play," and Miss Anglin confessed that none remained a favorite long. She lifted change.

"Only, of course, I like Shakespeare best of all."

She was to have played this past summer in the Shakespeare festival at Stratford-on-Avon had the war not interfered.

"We wanted so much to do something to help while we were here," Miss Anglin said. "But it seemed impossible to arrange it, and I guess the people are giving all they can, anyway."

Social engagements, however, are being left out this visit.

"I don't think we should go in for too much of that sort of thing in war time, do you?"

Canadian audiences came in for a hoped-for bit of appreciation, but particularly the western audiences. And Canadian summers, with swimming and canoeing, have Miss Anglin's heartiest support. She had wondered a little if the war might diminish Canadian audiences, and when she expressed our conviction that Toronto people would cut their theatre-going somewhere else than on the performance of their own Canadian actress, she smilingly assured us that that was "what she liked best to be called."

Then there was a pleasant goodbye, a gentle swish across grey boards and past the stranded tea-table to rugs and lights and glimpses of radiant ball-room. When we reached the back of the theatre and stopped to look the rose-leaf figure was dominating all the glittering stage, and the gracious personality was reaching out hands of comradeship and goodwill to rows of dimly-seen but responsive humanity in the darkness of the theatre.
