What are Arabi's intentions? is the one paramount question here. Will he make a stand at Kafir-el-Dwar and stake his power upon a single battle? That he will do this is the sincere hope of all friends of order; as with the reinforcements coming, the British troops will have a COMPARATIVELY EASY CONQUEST.

The circumstances that Arabi is requisition ing the country for horses may indicate preparations for further flight and a stand at a point farther inland. He has despatched the under-secretary of war to Cairo to bring there will be any serious defection from the army at that point.
