GEN. STEWART'S SUCCESS NOT SO PRONOUNCED AS REPORTED.

Great Anxiety for the Safety of the Ex-

pedition-wolseley Hurt by a Fail from a Camel. London, Jan. 23.—The war office has received no news concerning Stewart's ad-vance since the account of Saturday's bat tle. The absence of news causes consider able anxiety. The heads of the war depart ment met at noon to consider the situation. It is asserted Wolseley fell from a camel some time ago and was injured so badly that he had to remain at Korti. The Times, Telegraph and Standard have not yet received their reports of the battle at Abu Klea, although they had special correspondents in the field. This increased the anxiety concerning the fate of Stewart. It is believed the battle at the wells was more severe than the govern-ment is willing to admit. There is an im-pression that the efficial reports were colored at the war office, and that special despatches were intercepted by the cen-sors because they contained information which would throw an objectionable light on the affair. on the affair
