I would point out that a vessel may be stranded in 10 or 15 teet of water or more, according to her draft, and if at some distance from the shore it would be not only feasible but necessary to use a lifeboat to rescue the crew. Your correspondent was quite right in pointing out that it might be better to use the lifeboat before the vessel stranded if possible and that the rocket apparatus would be more suitable afterwards. Everything depends on locality and circumstances as to which of the two is the more practicable. The essential features of the lifeboat are, as I pointed out before, that she should be unsinkable, uncapsizable and self-bailing, so that she will live in surf or other broken water that will swamp or capsize any other open boat. In illustrating these conditions I mentioned stranding because it is a common form of marine disaster due to extens of weather.
