

SINGLE BUDGET FOR CHURCH

Urged by Laymen at the Annual London Methodist Conference

WOULD CONTINUE MOVE FOR UNION OF CHURCHES

Delegates Charge That Presbyterians Are Blocking Co-operative Scheme

Laymen and ministerial delegates to the annual London Methodist Conference concluded their separate sessions yesterday afternoon. While routine business occupied the attention of the clergy, the laymen's association, under the chairmanship of William Heaman, considered such important matters as the consummation of church union and the revision of the Methodist discipline along more democratic lines.

In the proposed revision of the discipline, which will be considered by the general session of the conference, it is requested that the general commission apply the principle of equal representation of ministers and laymen on all church boards, committees and conferences. It was contended that laymen should have the same rights and privileges at conferences and other meetings as the ministers if the work of the church is to be adequately conducted.

WANT LAY HELP. Undaunted by the strenuous task which the ministerial members of the national committee face each year, the association also asked that laymen be appointed on this body and share the responsibility and arduous work of placing the various ministers each spring. President Heaman commended the step taken to revise the discipline as being

a wise one and justified in the interests of democracy. If the conference proper approves of the resolution it will be forwarded to the general conference of the Canadian church for ratification.

It was the consensus of opinion of the association that the Methodists should continue to carry out the program of organic union with the Presbyterian church, but until its consummation they should continue with unceasing effort the propagation and extension of the Methodist church. John C. Hay, of Listowel, and Geo. Stanley, of Lucan, were particularly vehement on the subject, and freely criticized the Presbyterians for "blocking" co-operative union. The latter delegate took exception also to the methods of the Presbyterians in Windsor, who he alleged had gone so far as to build a church on the property acquired by the Methodists for the same purpose.

CANDIDATES RECEIVED. At the ministerial session the following candidates were received into the conference: A. W. S. Hosking and O. Gerald Lawson, of London; John W. Burton, of Godwin; Stanley M. Sweet, of London; Robert B. Cumming, of Ridgeway; and Wallace H. Moss, of St. Thomas.

Rev. Dr. E. N. Baker, principal of Albert College, Belleville, told the conference of the building program contemplated by his institution. Eighty per cent of the students there were active in Christian work, and 36 of them were preparing for the ministry or the mission field. The ideal of the college was that no young man or woman should be kept out of it through lack of funds. In order to maintain this ideal \$250,000 was necessary with which to finish and equip the new buildings and leave them free of all liability. The principal stated that the never was a time when there was such an enthusiastic response to conversation on religious matters as there is to-day. Fifty members of the London Conference, he added, were educated at Albert College.

The conference passed a resolution, expressing its appreciation of the talk given by the principal, and promised him confidence and support in his undertaking.

ELECTION TO-DAY. The election of conference president is one of the important items on the agenda of the conference this morning and it is predicted that close voting will result.

CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS IMPORTANT CHANGE TORONTO-WINNIPEG TRAIN SERVICE.

"The National" Restored as Daily Train

Effective Sunday, June 4th, Canadian National Railways will restore daily service between Toronto and Winnipeg via Capreol and Port Arthur. The train from Toronto, No. 2, "The National," will continue to leave at 10:35 P. M. (standard time) and train from Winnipeg will leave at 5:15 P. M. These trains will carry most modern equipment of standard and tourist sleeping cars with compartment-observation-library cars and dining car service.

Through standard sleeper Toronto-Winnipeg will leave as usual on Grand Central Railway train at 10:15 P. M. daily for North Bay, where connection is made with the famous "Continental" train for Montreal or Vancouver and Pacific coast points so that the daily services through Port Arthur or Cochrane offers a pleasing choice of routes between Eastern and Western Canada, "The National Way."

A reckless auto driver who was dashing wildly up Waterloo street early last evening may face several damage actions shortly as a result of injuries caused to various cars.

It was stated last night when near the C. P. R. crossing the wild driver smashed his own car badly by running into a telegraph pole.

The Chatham Board of Education has already passed such a resolution and William Reid, a member of the committee, suggested that London take similar steps.

Trustee Thomas Rowe brought the matter to a head by asking: "Is there not general criticism of the Adolescent Act throughout the province?" "There is," chairman Smith, of the Board replied. "The act should not have been extended to be made applicable beyond the 16th year."

MUST SAVE CANADA FOR WHITE RACES

Oriental Must Not Dominate, I. O. D. E. Told

VANCOUVER, May 31.—(By Beatrice Green, for the Canadian Press)—With the launching this morning of the long-anticipated discussion of the proposed amendments to the I.O.D.E. constitution, the 22nd annual convention of the national chapter, now in session, advances from the routine business of Monday and Tuesday into the more serious undertakings of the convention. Presentation of national life membership was made to Mrs. Osroode Mc-Vean, Dresden, Ont.

Mrs. W. D. Spence, Edmonton, presented a report on immigration, outlining the work done by the Canadian Council of Immigration. The work of assimilating and educating the many races of the Dominion into one true Canadian people was a responsibility that should be shared by the members of the I.O.D.E., she said.

OVERSEAS SELECTION. In addition to establishing hostels in each province with the aid of the Government, the council, continued Mrs. Spence, had made recommendations to the immigration department for careful overseas selection, care of ports of embarkation and the arrival of women immigrants.

The council had also urged discontinuance of the present bonus system. A system of pink tickets, or landing cards, had been arranged. Women inspectors at London, Liverpool and Glasgow pass on the eligibility of every woman who intends to come to Canada and the pink slip certifies her good health and adaptability to become a good citizen.

In conclusion, Mrs. Spence said: "We cannot afford to allow Orientals to dominate Canada, or even one of its provinces."
