LOCAL AND SPECIAL

The closing exercises at Acadia are being held this week.

The D. A. R. excursion rates to Wolfville are extended to the 15th instant.

Supreme Court meets at Bridgetown on the 19th instant, Judge Graham presiding.

A. R. Bishop has raised the house of Miss James on Queen street and his family have moved in.

West Paradise now has mail service four times a week, Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday.

Mass will be celebrated at St. Alphonsus's Church next Sunday at 11 a. m., Father McKinnon officiating.

The second League show will be held on Saturday next and a full attendance of competitors is requested.

Thomas Foster has purchased from J. H. Hicks and Sons the new cottage they are now building on Washington street.

The case of assault referred to last week, Milbury vs. Wagner, in which information was laid before Justice Cox did not come up for trial, the plaintiff withdrawing the action.

The Town Clerk reports that the town account showed a credit balance yesterday morning a condition of the town finances which has not existed before for several years.

The abolition of the town council to shut off the water where the parties are in arrears applies to all cases where the water is not paid for up to next November as the charge for water is payable in advance and any person not squared up to next November is "in arrears."

The Centreville section now has a mail of its own twice a week, but in order to get this concession from the postal department it has been obliged to change its name and hereafter will be known as "Centreville." The mail days are Wednesday and Saturday, mail leaving by carrier, Edward Messenger, after arrival of afternoon train.

An Orchardist's convention is to be held at Annapolis on Friday, June 7th, for the purpose of discussing the best means of exterminating the Brown-tail Moth. The convention will be addressed by Dr. Fletcher, dominion entomologist of Ottawa, Prof. Sears, Prof. Smith, Mr. G. H. Vroom and others. The D. A. R. will grant a single railway fare to all people attending the convention. Everyone interested in combatting this pest is invited to be present.

The death of Mr. David Hatt, who has been residing during the past two years with O. S. Milne, occurred on Monday afternoon, after an illness from pneumonia, followed by general collapse. Mr. Hatt who was a former resident of Bloomington leaves a widow and one son, William E. Hatt, of Lawrencetown. The funeral will take place at one o'clock today at the home of Mr. Milne, after which the remains will be conveyed to Netawak for interment.

An S. P. C. A. case came up for trial before the Hon. Magistrate, Elias Messenger, on Monday, continuing Tuesday morning, at the instance of John Irvin, president of the Bridgetown branch of the Association, who was also the prosecuting attorney, when two Belleisle farmers, Johnson Bruce and Eadon Palmer, were summoned to answer the charge of cruelty to their horses. The horses had been harnessed together to a heavy load and when mangle to haul the load had been lashed, kicked and prodded with a pitchfork according to the statement of the witnesses who also stated that such treatment of the animals had been habitual on the part of the owners. The Justice upon hearing the evidence promptly fined the defendants \$5.00 each, with costs, amounting to \$14.00, payable between them. Mr. Palmer accepted his fine, but Mr. Bruce will appeal to the County Court which meet at Annapolis on July.
