Total \$250 for a 36-inch door. Total elapsed time; three weeks for items 1 to 18, five weeks from 1 to 19.

CIVIL SERVICE WILL STRONGLY PROTEST

Against Any Drastic Downward Cut of Salaries in Govt. Offices.

Ottawa—Opposition of Civil Service organizations in Canada to any drastic downward revision of salaries in government offices will be presented to the Government and the Civil Service Commission by representatives of the Civil Service organizations during their meetings here on February 9th and 10th next. The principal demand of the organized Civil Servants, it is understood, will be for a superannuation measure which will provide greater compensation for civil servants over 65 years old, and permit of the withdrawal of a greater number who have passed that age.

Increased salaries in certain sections and an arrangement whereby joint councils of civil servants and heads of departments can be held periodically, also will be asked by the committee. The delegation has prepared definite proposals which will be submitted to the government. Meantime these have not been made public.

WILL BE PAID \$15,000 YEARLY IS REPORT

George Gonthier New Auditor General.

Ottawa—Although the order-in-council, which appoints him does not specify his salary, it is reported, according to The Citizen, that George Gonthier, of Montreal, newly appointed auditor general, will be paid \$15,000 a year. This would be the highest salary paid any officer of the government, and will exceed that of the cabinet ministers outside of the premier.

UNITED STATES TRADE FIGURES

Britain the Best Customer, With Canada a Close Second.

Washington—Great Britain was again the best customer of the United States in 1923. It was shown in commerce department figures for the twelve months ending December 31st, but Canada recorded marked improvement in its trade relations with the United States.

Exports to Great Britain were \$882,333,850 against \$885,825,991 in 1922. United States imports from Great Britain were less than half of the exports, amounting to \$404,114,419 in 1923, as compared with \$356,867,428 in 1922.

Canada was a close second to Great Britain, taking \$851,920,821 of exports and being the source of \$415,981,082 of United States imports for the year. In 1922 exports to Canada were \$576,686,759 and imports were \$364,024,797.

Lower Granville particularly enjoyed an address by Rev. Mr. Patterson on "Aims for Institute Members", and a talk given by a representative of the Berean College for the Mennonite people of Kentucky, who spoke on women's work in that district. A paper on "Child Welfare in N. S." was a feature of the meeting under direction of the Health Committee. At Bridgetown each of the committees had one or more helpful programmes. An article on the life of Pauline Johnson, read at a recent meeting at Paradise, held special interest as the members had, on a previous occasion, had the pleasure of listening to an address by the writer of the article, Mr. Walter MacRae.

The W. I. members have also been interested in programmes presented in connection with the school. At the close of the school exhibition, held under the auspices of the Lower Granville W. I., addresses were delivered by local clergymen and visitors. Assistance was also given the teacher in preparing a programme for May 23rd, when the flag was raised on a new flag-pole presented by the Institute. On this occasion trees were planted as memorials to the soldiers and nurses who heroically served during the war. A speaker was secured to address the Paradise scholars on Patriotism and four flags were presented to the school.

## CURATE PAID FOR JOKE ON BISHOP

Sent Him From Isle of Man to Liverpool by Bogus Telegram.

London—A Socialist government may be in power in Britain but it is not safe for a curate joke with a bishop.

The Rev. Walter James KARRANS, curate of a parish on the Isle of Man, tried it with the Bishop of Sodor and Man. He sent a bogus telegram to the bishop and signed it with the name of ex-Premier Stanley Baldwin.

The sequel was played out in a Liverpool police court when the curate was fined £10 and ordered to pay twenty-five guineas costs. Miss Alice Winston, a safe manager, in whose company during a steamer excursion KARRANS conceived this practical joke, was allowed to go.

The fates decreed that the recipient of the telegram induced the bishop to make a fruitless journey to Liverpool on a day when he should have moved the second reading of a church bill in the Legislative Council of the Isle of Man. That was no offence likely to be forgiven a curate. It was even suggested that his action was part of a political plot to prevent the second reading of the bill.
