

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that His Ex-location of the Governor General has been pleased, by an Order in Council, bearing date December 4th, 1856, to approve of the following Regulations and Orders, under which goods may to imported into Canada by nailroad without subjecting them to entry for dury at the Frontier Port, or to the necessity of being forwarded under Frontier Bonds.

By Command, R. S. M. BOUCHETTE, Commissiones of Customs:

All Railroad Companies having a line or lines of Railway crossing the Provincial Boundary, or which have a terminus at or near such Boundary, or that have a terminus upon the border of any of the navigable Waters of the Province, shall be allowed to transport goods along their respective lines without such goods being detained at frontier Ports, for the such groups of being examined at trouter Ports, for the purpose of being examined and entered at the Custion House, or without then being letained until frontier Bonds are exceuted, upon such Railroad Companies complying with and conforming to the Rules and Regulations following:
