biting stone houses or wooden houses, supported by stone-built cellars, have suddenly been thrown into great discomfort, and some into extreme distress. In truth, the calamity which has come upon this island is of such a nature, that, in the destruction of man, it has gone almost beyond the power of exaggeration. In the preservation of human life, however, marvellous mercy has been shown; not more than eight persons were killed. The mercy of God has been so strikingly manifested, that every tongue is ready to confess it. Would that all might be so impressed with the sense of the divine goodness, as to be led to show forth their gratitude, not only with their lips, but in their lives!"

The Lord Bishop of Barbadoes, in a letter dated Barbadoes, March 6th, 1843, informed the Society that the shock was felt there, but that the destruction caused by the earthquake was confined to the Leeward Islands, which, with the exception of the Virgin Islands, had suffered more or less, and some of them very severely. His Lordship's more immediate object in writing was to request the Society's sanction of a step which, under the afflicting circumstances just adverted to, he had felt himself called upon to take, which was to transfer to the diocese of Antigua one half of the grant (2000l.) placed at his disposal, in December last, for the furtherance of the Society's designs in his diocese. He added—"The case will, I trust, speak for itself, and induce the Society to sanction this diversion of their bounty from its intended purpose, to one so appallingly urgent. Under ordinary circumstances, I should have been unwilling, indeed I could not have felt myself at liberty to deprive my own diocese of the advantages proposed in this grant, or in the transfer of property, but in the present relative position of the two Churches, ours, preserved altogether from this calamitous visitation, the sister Church of Antigua so severely suffering from it, I felt assured that my clergy and our people would most readily concur in what I have done; and I will equally, I trust, meet with the Society's approval. I have offered the remainder of 1000l. to the Archdeacon as a loan, and have also sent him the portion assigned to the diocese of Antigua out of the unexpended balance of a former grant left by my predecessor for that diocese."

The secretary reported that the standing committee recommend that at the general meeting on the 2nd of May, a grant of 1000l. be voted, to be placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop of Antigua, towards the restoration of the churches and chapels in his diocese.
