

- Cox Cable and HomeServ are operating a joint venture banking, shopping and home entertainment service for 700 customers in San Diego and Omaha. The "Armchair Banking" service offers balance inquiry, inter-account funds transfer, bill payment, transaction review, and information about bank branches and products. Users pay \$5.95 a month and transaction fees of 5 to 20 cents per screen or transaction. HomeServ has encrypted all financial information so an illegal tap would not produce meaningful data.
- The Genesys Group of Ottawa, Canada, has developed a telebanking service for Empire Savings Bank of America. Approximately 50 corporate customers are now testing the service using desk-top personal computers. The service offers cash management, balance enquiries and funds transfer.
- The Chemical Bank's Pronto service in New York has more than 300 subscribers. (It is not standardized to the NAPLPS protocol.)
