SIR,

I have the honour to refer to the Notes exchanged at Ottawa on the 22 and 24 of February, 1950, in terms of which it was agreed to suspend until the 31 of December, 1950, the margins of preference on unmanufactured logs, classified under Union Tariff sub-items 279 (a) (i) and (ii), which are guaranteed to Canada by virtue of the Trade Agreement of 1932 between the Union and Canadian Governments.

I now acknowledge receipt of your Note of 3 January, 1951, and have the honour to inform you that the Canadian Government agrees with the Union Government's proposal that the margins of preference on unmanufactured log<sup>5</sup> be suspended for a further period on the understanding—

"(a) That such temporary suspension.....

..... into the Union of South Africa."

The Canadian Government agrees that your Note and this reply shall constitute an agreement between our two Governments on this matter with effect from the 1st of January, 1951.
