In 1915, seven miles of loop line from South Gut to Munroes Point, and four miles extension from Washabuck Centre to Grass Pond.

5. Work of construction paid for in 1914 by D. C. Dawson, district superintendent, and in 1915 by C. W. McKee, acting district superintendent. Poles were paid for by cheque from the department.
