Question No. 921—**Mr. McCleave:**

1. Did the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development recently send one or more of its officers to France to recruit graduates of the architectural and other professions and, if so (a) who went abroad (b) how long were these trips (c) what were the results?
2. Were attempts made to recruit Canadian professionals before such recruitment and with what results?
3. Is this recruitment program part of a two million dollar plan for Francophone recruitment?

Hon. Gérard Pelletier (Secretary of State): I am informed by the Public Service Commission as follows:

1. Yes. (a) J. E. Savage, Assistant Director, and J. Dalibard, Chief Restoration Architect, Technical Services Branch, Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development. (b) J. E. Savage, two weeks. J. Dalibard, three and one half weeks. (c) Contacts were established with officials of the Government of France and officials and members of the Compagnie des Architectes en Chef des Monuments Historiques to facilitate the temporary employment by Canada of Architects specially trained and skilled in the restoration of French period structures, to meet the program demands of the National and Historic Parks Service.

STUDENT EMPLOYMENT EUROPE

Question No. 934—**Mr. Peddle:**

1. To the knowledge of the government, have the activities of the organization known as SEE (Student Employment Europe) ceased and, if so, for what reason?
2. With regard to the investigation into the activities of this organization as referred to by the Minister of Manpower and Immigration at page 1761 of *Hansard*, December 4, 1970 (a) who were the principals of the organization (b) how many applications for summer employment were received by this organization from Canadian students (c) what was the total amount of money received by SEE in respect of these applications (d) was any attempt made by the government to see that refunds were made to the students concerned (e) in the final analysis, were the activities of SEE regarded as being illegal and, if so, what action was taken against the principals of the organization?

Hon. Otto E. Lang (Minister of Manpower and Immigration): To the knowledge of the Department of Manpower and Immigration, the following applies: 1. In a statement to the House on December 4, 1970 the Minister indicated that investigations were being made in regard to this organization and that it had no official connection whatever with the government and indeed had no official means of assuring placement of the students abroad. This is still the the situation. The activities of the organization known as SEE (Student Employment Europe) have not ceased despite assurances given to officials of the Department that the organization was ceasing operations.

2(a) A News Release issued in October, 1970 by SEE was over the signature of a Mrs. Mary Ricard. It is also known that a Mr. Jens T. Wahl has acted on behalf of the organization both in Canada and with the Central Labour Office in Germany. The German authorities have advised that they cannot entertain applications for student summer employment from SEE or any other private, non-governmental body. (b) This information is not available. ASIAN DEVELOPMENT BANK—CANADA'S SUBSCRIPTION

Question No. 942—**Mr. Robinson:**

1. What has been Canada's contribution to the Asian Development Bank since its inception?
2. What has been the contribution of each of the 19 Asian members to the Asian Development Bank since it was set up?
3. What has been the contribution of each of the 13 non-Asian members of the Asian Development Bank for each year since its inception?

Mr. André Ouellet (Parliamentary Secretary to Secretary of State for External Affairs): 1. Canada's subscription to the capital stock of the Asian Development Bank is US \$25 million, one-half of which is paid in and one-half callable. Canada has also pledged the equivalent of US \$25 million to the Bank's multipurpose Special Fund and US \$200,000 to the Bank's Technical Assistance Special Fund. Of these amounts, all of the technical assistance contribution and US \$15 million of the Multipurpose contribution has been to date made available to the Bank.

2. Subscriptions to the capital stock of the Bank by each of the 21 regional members of the ADB are shown below. One-half of each subscription is callable and one-half is paid in. All figures are in millions of US dollars.
