

Mr. Hawkes: They want those drug companies. They talk about profits. They want them to be able to charge what they like.

This Government wants a price review board not to look at 7 drugs out of 100, but to look at 100 out of 100 to make sure that there is not a single drug on the market on which Canadians are being ripped off. We want drugs that work, save lives, and save pain and anguish. We need this patent protection so we can get first quality medical service and jobs.
