Note: Includes knitted wear of spun rayon and synthetic fibre as defined in the Explanatory Notes and also knitted wear of synthetic fibres blended with wool, containing more than 50 per cent by weight of synthetic fibre. The Japanese authorities take note of the request of the Canadian authorities to hold consultations at an early date concerning an appropriate division of the quota into sub-quotas or the establishment of appropriate ceilings under the quota.

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- Note:* 1. Within the overall quota for cotton fabrics, dyed corduroy may not exceed 2,000,000 square yards.
2. The Japanese Government will use its best endeavours with Japanese producers and exporters so that within the quota there will be no undue concentration on any particular items.

Sheets	Cotton	766,000 pieces

Note: Either of the quotas for pillow cases or sheets may be increased by not more than 10 per cent by transfer from the other quota, using the following conversion ratio:

Pillow cases	1 dozen—13.008 square yards
Sheets	1 piece—6.200 square yards

Elastic Braid	All Textile Fibres	500,000 pounds
Fabrics	Nylon	3,300,000 sq. yds.

Explanatory Notes

1. All of the above quotas apply to total exports in the twelve-month period ending December 31st, 1967.

2. With regard to cotton textile products,

- (1) shipments under the quotas and sub-quotas may be increased by not more than five per cent in 1967, with equivalent reductions in shipments under the corresponding quotas and sub-quotas for 1968.
- (2) shipments under the quotas and sub-quotas for 1968 may be increased by not more than five per cent, should shipments in 1967 fall short of the corresponding quotas and sub-quotas by equivalent amounts.

3. In the above table "Synthetic" includes rayon filament and all other man-made fibres except spun rayon, except in the case of synthetic shirts, as noted. See also Note 5 relating to mixtures of fibres.

4. In connection with the swing provisions, and also more generally, the Japanese Government will use its best endeavour to urge Japanese producers and exporters to so plan their shipments that there will be no undue concentration on any item within the quota categories.
