

41. Whenever a matter or question directly concerning the privileges of the Senate or of any committee or member thereof, has arisen, a motion calling upon the Senate to take action thereon may be moved, without notice, and shall, until decided, unless the debate be adjourned, suspend the consideration of other motions as well as Orders of the Day. M. 237, 264: B. 302, sq.

Question of privilege.

Its precedence in certain cases.

42. Any senator complaining to the Senate of a statement in a newspaper as a breach of privilege, shall produce a copy of the paper containing the statement in question. M. 98 sq.: B. 63.

Complaints against newspapers.

43. Any senator may require the question under discussion to be read at any time during the debate, but not so as to interrupt any other senator while speaking. B. 353.

Question read.

44. When a question is under debate, no motion is received, unless to amend it; to commit it; to postpone it to a certain day; for the previous question; for reading the Orders of the Day, or for the adjournment of the Senate. B. 316, sqq., 322, sqq., 324, sq. 326.
