August 17th, 1931.

On the fifteenth your friend
Professor Tatsunosuke Ueda called on me at
my house on McTavish Street. It was Saturday
and he caught me just as I was leaving to spend
the day in the country. As he went on to New
York that night it was impossible for us to
have more than a brief ten minutes conversation.
We had no time to discuss schools of commerce
or business conditions in Canada and I was indeed
sorry, because he seemed to me a most pleasant,
well informed man, and it would have given me
great pleasure to have shown him some courtesy
while here. I was glad to be told that herleft
you and the Princess in excellent health.

My wife and I reached home on the twenty-sixth of April. It was a fast trip across the Pacific as the Empress of Japan on that occasion broke the trans-Pacific record. We remained three days in Victoria, our old home, and after two days in Vancouver came direct to Montreal.

Shortly after reaching home we had the pleasure of participating in a number of functions in honour of Their Imperial Highnesses the Prince and Princess Takamatsu.
