Cage's Men Willing to Settle
Tie on M.A.A.A. Grounds
—Rugby Games Today.

Varsity authorities yesterday stated that in case of McGill beating Queens today, creating a tie in the College Union, they would be willing to play off in Montreal on the M.A.A.A. grounds, but not at McGill.

Shaughnessy, proprietor of the McGill team, will likely accept the proposition, and thus if the tie is made today, the other two teams the three are pretty likely to be decided next Saturday as follows:

Intercollegiate—Varsity V. McGill, at M.A.A.A. grounds, at Hamilton.

Interprovincial—Argonauts V. Tigers, at Varsity grounds, at Hamilton.

Ontario Union—T.R. & A.A. V. Hamilton Rowing Club, at Hamilton.

Argos have applied for the use of the stadium, and the athletic directorate are holding the students' field for the use of the Big Four, but nothing definite will be done till next week. It is understood that in case of a tie in the Ontario Union Toronto are willing to play off in Hamilton.

As stated before in order to produce the three ties the games today must result as follows:

Argos beat Montreal at Rosedale.

Tigers beat Ottawa at Hamilton.

McGill beat Queens at Montreal.

Will they?

These games wind up the regular schedules.

The Montreal team that play Argos at Rosedale this afternoon, starting at 2:30, have won two games this fall, and are sure to make the Argonauts their best opponents. The Argos will have out their strongest line-up.

At Varsity the exhibition game with the Hamilton Rowing Club will serve to keep the two teams in shape for a week later.

ST. MICHAELS ARE CHAMPIONS AGAIN
Came From Behind to Beat McGill for the Intermediate Intercollegiate Honors.

Friday the 13th, St. Michael's College won the Intercollegiate Intermediate honors by 13 points on the field, and McGill's score yesterday was 13 points. Some combination. It was a funny football game from start to finish. McGill went into the fray two points behind, from the Saints were down one point at the quarter, 7 at the half, but came back like whirlwinds in the second half and won away off 24 to 13.

McGill looked all over winners at the half time whistle. They started their trick plays well back of the line and were moving in good shape when they struck the Saints, thereby having a better footing in the line when the impact took place. Williscroft was kicking well at the right time, and his wing line was doing good work. Two kicks were blocked, tied up to tries that gave McGill their early lead. The Saints were erratic in their passing, and they failed with their backs, usually their strong point. The half time score was: McGill 13, St. Michael's 6.

It was just the reverse after half time. McGill found that St. Michael's had solved their tricks and broke up the interference every time. St. Michael's put vim into their backs and tore the McGill line to pieces. Time after time they gained their yards, and Broderick's kicking was good. McGill lost heart after thinking the battle was won, and the Saints kept up their smashing tactics through the second half.

St. Michael's won the toss and McGill kicked against a strong cold wind that swept down the field. After kicks back and forward St. Michael's lost for interference and McGill bucked for yards. Williscroft booted behind and Canfield was downed for the first point. Broderick's kick was blocked and McGill had only ten yards to go. Ferguson was shoved over on the second down. McGill's Williscroft took a kick and went 20 yards out. St. Michael's bucked Brown over on the last down. The quarter ended 6 to 5 for McGill.

McGill were in possession 30 yards out when the second quarter opened. They were given ten more for offside, and on the second down Woods carried it over. McGill 11, St. Michael's 6. Williscroft kicked to the deadline to make the half time score McGill 11, St. Michael's 6.

It was a different story in the second half. Broderick opened the third quarter by kicking a point. Williscroft fumbled a punt, and Ryan fell on it 20 yards out. McGill tried a long pass, but it was fumbled, and St. Michael's were in possession. Williscroft was downed 10 yards out. The Saints pressed with the game close again, 18 to 12 for St. Michael's. Broderick kicked for two points before three quarters time, making 18 to 14.

A blocked kick was turned into a try for the Saints early in the last round, and Broderick converted it. Williscroft kicked to the deadline for the last point, making the final 24 to 13 for St. Michael's, and their second Intermediate championship in six years.
