### HORSE RACING NEXT **MONTH IN GERMANY**

Opening With Six Fixtures on Track Near Berlin-English Trainers.

BERLIN, via London, April 18 .- It is regarded in racing circles as virtually certain that racing will be resumed in Germany this year. The first fixtures will be a series of six Sunday races at Hoppegarten, near Berlin, beginning May 16, to test public sentiment.
