M. Ryan Makes New
Record 2.21.18 1-5
In Boston Marathon

BOSTON, April 19.—Over an unusually sticky course, Mike Ryan, wearing the colors of the Irish-American Athletic Club of New York, won the Boston Athletic Association's 16th Marathon race to-day, cut the former record 21 2/5 seconds and practically assured himself of a place on the American Olympic team. Ryan ran the 26 miles in 2 hours 21 minutes 18 1/5 seconds, against a field that included western athletes, Carlisle Indians and the sturdiest long-distance men in the east. The former record was 2 hours 21 minutes 33 3/5 seconds, held by Clarence De Mar of the North Dorchester A.C., whose former performances are sufficient to qualify him for the Olympic games. As Andrew Schachtel, the Old Town Indian, but a North Dorchester A.C. man, ran a close second to Ryan and missed equalling De Mar's record by 14 seconds, it is thought that he may be taken to Stockholm also. The race to-day was run in a drizzling rain, which turned the surface of the road into slime, and it was only by taking to the sidewalks at intervals that the runners were able to make time.
